Westminster, August 2.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr. Quarmer, Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for repealing the Duty imposed on Tea by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, and for granting other Duties in lieu thereof; for repealing so much of several Acts as relates to the Removal of Tea; for directing the Officers of Excise to examine and certify the Exportation of Exciseable Commodities; and for better securing the Duties on Candles.

An Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intitled, An Act for granting to His Majesty a Stamp Duty on Licences to be taken out by certain Persons uttering or vending Medicines, and certain Stamp Duties on all Medicines sold under such Licences, or under the Authority of His Majesty's Letters Patent, and for granting other Duties in lieu thereof.

An Act for granting to His Majesty additional Duties on Hawkers, Pedlars and Petty Chapmen, and for regulating their Trade.

An Act to extend the Provisions of an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for granting to His Majesty a Stamp Duty on the Registry of Burials, Marriages, Births and Christenings to the Registry of Burials, Births and Christenings of Protestant Dissenters from the Church of England.

An Act for granting to His Majesty certain Duties on Certificates to be taken out by Solicitors, Attornies, and others practising in certain Courts of Justice in Great Britain, and certain other Duties with respect to Warrants, Mandates and Authorities to be entered or filed of Record, as therein mentioned.

An Act for the better securing the Duties payable on Tobacco.

An Act to rectify a Mistake in an Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intitled, An Act to repeal the Duties on Male Servants, and for granting new Duties on Male and Female Servants.

An Act to declare that Brewers selling Beer or Ale in less Quantities than a Cask containing Four Gallons and a Half shall not be entitled to any Allowance out

of the Duties of Excise for Waste or Leakage; and for making Allowances to Distillers of Low Wines and Spirits from Malt, Corn or Grain, in respect to the Duties imposed by an Act of the last Session of Parliament.

An Act for extending the Time limited by an Act of this Session, for delivering in Navy, Victualling, and Transport Bills.

An Act for appointing Commissioners further to inquire into the Losses and Services of all such Persons who have suffered in their Rights, Properties, and Professions during the late unhappy Dissensions in America, in consequence of their Loyalty to His Majesty, and Attachment to the British Government.

An Act to limit the Duration of Polls and Scrutinies, and for making other Regulations touching the Election of Members to serve in Parliament for Places within England and Wales, and for Berwick upon Tweed; and also for removing Difficulties which may arise for Want of Returns being made of Members to serve in Parliament.

Petersburgh, July 1.

The Empress, upon her Arrival at Visknei-Volotchok, thought proper to extend her Progress as far as Moscow. In that Capital and its Neighbourhood she remained Four Days; after which, returning by the same Road to Visknei-Volotchok, her Imperial Majesty proceeded to Borowitz, where she embarked with her Suite upon the Msta; and after a very agreeable Navigation of Eight Days on that River, Lake Ilmen, the Volkow, the Ladoga Canal, and the Neva, arrived here Yesterday Evening. In the Course of her Tour various Orders of Knighthood, and other Marks of Distinction, were conferred by the Empress on the Governors and Lieutenant-Governors of the Provinces through which she passed. Her Imperial Majesty also left some very considerable Sums of Money at Moscow, and in other Places, for the founding and endowing of Hospitals, and the carrying on of other important Public Works.

The Empress will set out this Evening for Peterhoff, to celebrate the Anniversary of her Accession to the Throne, and the Festival of St. Peter and St. Paul (the Great Duke's Name's Day) after which she purposes returning to Czarisko-Zelo.

Copenhagen, July 19.

An Edict has been published here lately, containing some Regulations with regard to the Bank in this Capital, by which no Bank Notes are to be issued in future, without a Deposit of the real Value, either in Cash or in Effects, which may immediately be converted into Cash; and upon such Effects only the Bank is to lend Money hereafter.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That there is Reason to expect that dangerous and illegal Combinations have of late been entered into by Persons concerned or employed in the Coal Trade, in order to advance the Price of Coals, by Means whereof a regular Supply of that Article, on just and reasonable Terms, is prevented from coming to the Market, many Ships laden with Coals having remained for a considerable Time, and are still remaining in the River Thames, without delivering their Cargoes: His Majesty, in order to bring to due Punishment such Persons as have engaged in Combinations so oppressive to the Community, and so pernicious in their Example, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any Person or Persons who, by having been actually engaged in such Combinations, have thereby exposed themselves to Prosecution and Punishment, who will discover the Authors, Promoters or Parties in any Way concerned in such Combinations to raise the Price of Coals as aforesaid, so as that he or they may be brought to Justice for the same.

And, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is also pleased to promise a Reward of **TWO HUNDRED POUNDS** to any Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That on the 23d Day of June last, the Ship *Jonge Hindrick*, of Embden, Captain *Willem De Vries*, being on her Voyage from Havre de Grace to Ostend, with a Cargo of Sugar and Coffee, was met off Beachy Head by a Vessel supposed to be English, manned with about Fourteen People, who, after having hailed Captain *De Vries*, ordered him to bring-to, which he refusing, they armed themselves with Blunderbusses (among which was a Brass one) Guns, Pistols, Cutlasses, and other offensive Weapons, threatening to fire on Board, and to shoot the Captain if he did not comply: That in order to save his Life the Captain was at last obliged to bring-to, when Ten of the Crew of the said unknown Vessel came armed on Board his Ship, forced the Mate to open the Hatches, took and carried away a considerable Quantity of Sugar, and as much Coffee as their Vessel would hold, consisting of Fifty-one Bales marked MF, and Fifteen marked HD, robbed Captain *De Vries* of his Wearing Apparel, a Dozen Shirts, and various other Articles, together with Two Compasses, and other Effects belonging to the Mate and Sailors; and having kept them in Fear of their Lives for about Two Hours, the said Vessel sailed for the English Coast.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Piracy and Robbery above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them who shall discover his Accomplices therein, so that they, or any Two of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is also pleased to promise a Reward of **TWO HUNDRED POUNDS** to any Person making such Discovery as above-mentioned, to be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.
