A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS Our Houses of Parliament are adjourned to the Twenty-seventh Day of October next; We, judging it not requisite that they should sit at that Time, have, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby declaring and publishing Our Will and Pleasure, That Our Parliament shall, on the said Twenty-seventh Day of October next, be prorogued unto Thursday the First Day of December following: And We do hereby further declare, That due Notice shall be given by Proclamation of the Time when Our Parliament shall meet and sit for the Dispatch of Business, to the End that the Members of both Houses may order their Affairs accordingly. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirtieth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-five, in the Twenty-fifth Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the KING.

St. James's, September 30, 1785.

Ceremonial of the Knighthood and Investiture of Sir Frederick Haldimand, Lieutenant-General of His Majesty's Forces and Governor of Quebec, and of Sir Archibald Campbell, Major-General of His Majesty's Forces and Governor of Fort St. George in the East Indies, Knights of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath.

THE Knights and the Officers of the Order attended in the Privy Chamber, in their Mantles, &c. and proceeded from thence, after the Levee, into the Sovereign's Presence, making the usual Reverences, in the following Order:

Gentleman Usher of the Order, in his Mantle, Chain and Badge, bearing the Scarlet Rod.

Register and Secretary of the Order, in his Mantle, Chain and Badge, bearing (in the Absence of Bath King of Arms) the Ribbon and Badge of the Order on a Crimson Velvet Cushion.

Then, by the Sovereign's Command, Lieutenant-General Haldimand was introduced into the Presence between Sir Edward Hughes and Sir Guy Carleton, the Two Junior Knights present, preceded by the Gentleman Usher of the Order, with Reverences as before.

The Sword of State was delivered to the Sovereign by Sir William Draper, the Second Knight in Seniority, and Lieutenant-General Haldimand kneeling was knighted therewith. Then Lord Amherst, the Senior Knight, presented the Ribbon and Badge to the Sovereign, and His Majesty put them over the new Knight's Right Shoulder, who being thus invested had the Honour to kiss His Majesty's Hand.

In like Manner Major-General Campbell was afterwards introduced into the Presence, knighted, and invested with the Ribbon and Badge of the Order; and, having likewise kissed His Majesty's Hand, the Procession returned to the Privy Chamber, in the Order above-mentioned, the new Knights preceding.

The Ceremony was performed in His Majesty's Closet, several Great Officers of the Court being present.

One of the Persons who committed this Robbery is described to be about Fifty Years of Age, Five Feet Nine or Ten Inches high, lusty made, his Hair grey, which he wears hanging upon his Shoulders, smooth Face, and is supposed to be dressed in a blue Surtout Coat.

The other Person is about Thirty-six Years of Age, Five Feet Six or Seven Inches high, thin made, his Face red, wears his own Hair, and is supposed to be dressed in a dark-coloured Coat. They had both the Appearance of Farmers, and were seen in London the Evening of the Robbery.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, both or either of the Persons who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Persons whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby both or either of the Persons who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of both or either of the Parties, be entitled to the same Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.
