Lyme, Jan. 9.

**L**AST Night arrived here the *Elizabeth* of this place, in three dayes from *St. Malo*, laden with Linnen Cloth; the Master tells us, that several Ships were building there; that one of Fifty Guns was ready to be Launched; that the King was going to put a Garison into that City.

*Falmouth*, Jan. 10. The 8th instant came into this Port the *Industry* of *Bristol*, *Robert Drue* Master, from *Morlaix*. He came from thence on Monday last, and tells us, that several *French* Men of War are fitting at *Brest*, who, it's said, are designed for the *West-Indies*. The same day a *French* Prize, belonging to *Rochel*, laden with Wines, Brandy, and Provisions, and bound for the *West-Indies*, was sent in hither by the *Princes Mary*, a Privateer of *Flissing*, mounted with 24 Guns. In her company was taken another ship of 10 Guns, likewise bound with Provisions for the *West-Indies*. This Vessel that is come in, left the Privateer and the other Prize in the Channel, likewise designed for this Port; since it has blown very hard, which makes us in some fear for them.

*Bridlington*, Jan. 10. Yesterday arrived here a Vessel from *Ostred*, the Master says, that they were building there six small Frigats, which were intended for Privateers; and that People there were in daily expectation to hear of the march of the *French* Army.

*Naples*, Decemb. 15. The last account we have from *Sicily* is, that the Cardinal de *Porto Carrero*, Viceroy of that Kingdom, had put all his Troops into quarters; and by a Felucca arrived from *Palermo*, we have the confirmation of the burning of a *Spanish* Man of War, as she was Careerin, in that Port. The 27th past arrived here a Courier with Letters from the Governor of *Reggio*, to our Viceoy the Marquis de *los Velez*, who was within few hours sent back again. We have advice that several *French* Vessels laden with Provisions are arrived at *Messina*, under the Convoy of two Men of War; and that the Duke de *Vivonne* was preparing for his departure from thence, on his return for *France*, so soon as the Marechal de *la Feuillade*, who is appointed to succeed him, arrived. Levies are making throughout this Kingdom for the service of *Sicily*; but we hear that several late raised Troops have disbanded, so soon as they arrived in that Kingdom.

*Venice*, Decemb. 25. This week we have Letters from *Constantinople*, which say, that the Grand Signior had taken the Command of his Army from *Zait*. *Ibrahim Basha*, and had sent him Orders to repair forth-

with to *Constantinople*, to give an account of several matters, in which, it's thought, he will not be able to justify himself. The Prince *Radzevill*, who hath been treated here with great respect, by Order of the Senate, is preparing to return for *Poland*.

*Warsaw*, Decemb. 15. The Advices we receive from *Bialocerkiew*, confirm the former account we had, that General *Ramedanowski*, who commands the Army of the *Moscovites*, had passed the *Niesfer*, to go into their Winter-quarters, and that the *Turks* and *Tartars* had done the like. From *Constantinople* they write, that the Palatine of *Culm*, Ambassador of this Crown, had had some difference in the Conferences he had had with the Grand Visier, about the quitting of a place in *Podolia*, and two others in the *Ukraine*, which his Excellency has Orders to demand and insist upon; but we hope the *Turks* will at length be brought to condescend herein. The long absence of the Court begins to be very prejudicial to this City.

*Madrid*, Decemb. 25. The Count de *Tranion*, the Emperors Ambassador, hath been to visit the Queen at *Toledo*. Here are some reports in Town, as if her Majesty would suddenly return hither, but they deserve not any credit should be given to them. The Prince of *Parma* is, pursuant to the Kings Orders, arrived here, and we are told that he will have again the Government of *Catalonia*. The King has given Cardinal *Pio* a Pension of 10000 Crowns upon the Archbishoprick of *Palermo*, and 80000 Crowns kept upon the Archbishoprick of *Toledo*, which the King has granted in several Pensions. Commissions have been given out for the raising four Regiments of Foot, and Orders have been sent to the Prince de *Ligne*, Governor of *Milan*, to raise two other Regiments in that Countrey. We have seen of late several Couriers arrive here from *Sicily*, *Naples*, and *Ilanders*.

*Ratisbonne*, Decemb. 28. The States of the *Upper* and *Lower Austria*, which are assembled at *Vienna*, are upon the point to separate, having, among other things, resolved to exhort the Malecontents of *Hungary* to receive the general Pardon offered them by the Emperors; and to bring them to it, have promised to use their utmost endeavours with the Emperors, to obtain for them a free exercise of their Religion, and that they should have in the mean time three Churches restored to them; and at the same time we understand, that Orders have been sent to General *Cops*, who commands the Emperors Forces in those Parts, to do his utmost to bring matters to an accommodation. From *Caschau* in *Hungary* they write, that the Rebels were resolved to block up *Kalo* and *Bessermin*, two considerable places. The *Turks* make Levies in their Territories on the *Danube*. From *Basle* we have advice, that the Imperial Minister uses great instances with the *Swiss* Can-

to engage them in the preservation of the Lower Austria. The difference which has been some time depending between the Deputy of the Elector of Mentz, and the Deputy of the Duke of Zell, still continues, the endeavor of the Bishop of Aichstat, the Imperial Commissary, to compose it, having hitherto been without any effect.

*Amwerp, Jan. 15.* We know not at present any thing worth telling you from hence, but we cannot think we shall long continue so barren of News; there is great appearance that the Enemy will in few days attack some place or other, of which we talk at present very uncertainly: some think it will be Mons, others *Ipres*, a third *Newport*; a short time will let us see who of these is in the right. The Marechal d'Humieres, who is made Governor General of the French Conquests in these Countries, is come with an Army of 25000 men into the Neighborhood of *Aesch*; what his design is we know not.

*Amsterdam, Jan. 18.* Our Forces, we hear, are marching from several places, where they had their quarters, towards *Bribant*, the general Rendezvous being appointed near *Malinges*. The Prince of Orange will very suddenly be in those Parts. All the talk now here is, that the French will besiege *Ipres*. Our *Hamburg* Letters are not yet arriv'd, so that we have nothing new from those Parts.

*Paris, Jan. 15.* Yesterday was published an Order, commanding all Officers, for that his Majesty intended a very early Campaign this year, to be at their respective Commands on the 15. instant, on pain of losing the same, those excepted who served in Germany the last Campaign. The 8th instant the Marechal de la Feuillade parted hence for *Thoulon*, where he will embark, in order to his passing to *Messina*. He is accompanied by the Chevalier de *Luzac*, the Sieurs de *Wendau* and *de Remy*, and some other Officers of the Kings Guard. The Marechal de la Force is lately dead at his house in *Polignol*, aged 85 years. Our Letters from *Strasbourg* of the 6th instant say, that the Imperialists were fortifying *Philipsburg* and *Keslerland*, and are providing great Magazines there, and in other places; and that Colonel *Cawltz*, the Governor of *Rheinfeldt*, had taken the Castle of *Syrachach*, and put 8000 men into it. From *Treves* they write, that the Companies of the Regiment of *Portia*, which were put into Garrison there, were ordered to march to *Luxemburg*.

*Maryborough, Suffolk, Jan. 14.* On Wednesday last an English built Ship, of about 80 Tons burthen, discovered to be floating off *Albany*, was brought into that Harbor, being found without any Man or other living Creature (besides a Cat) aboard her; her Bulk is still entire, and, as 'tis supposed, her Ladings consists in French Wine and Brandy, which Ship and Ladings are carefully preserved by Sir Henry Fildes the Vice Admiral, a further Account may be given hereof, by Mr. Bedford at the Admiralty Court at Doctors Commons, London.

*Dover, Jan. 15.* On Monday arrived a Paquet-Boat from *Paris*, which brought Letters from *Paris* of Saturday was seven night; they gave us an account that the King had declared his intentions to make a very early Campaign, and therefore had commanded all Officers to repair immediately to their respective Commands. We are still wanting two Mails from *France*, and as many from *Holland*.

*Whitehall, January 16.* Yesterday the Two Houses of Parliament being met at the usual hour, pursuant to their last Adjournment, received a Message from His Majesty

That His Majesty had Matters of very great Importance to Communicate to Both Houses, in order to the Satisfaction of their late Addresses, for the Preservation of Flanders. But it so happening, that Matters are not yet so ripe, as within a few days they will be; therefore His Majesties Pleasure was, That they should be immediately Adjourned till Monday the 28 of this instant January.

And accordingly the Two Houses were Adjourned to the 28 of this Month.
