**T**UESDAY last, being the Anniversary of the King's Accession to the Throne, when His Majesty entered into the Twenty-sixth Year of His Reign, the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired at One o'Clock; and in the Evening there were Illuminations, and other public Demonstrations of Joy, in London and Westminster.

This Island has been again visited by a Hurricane equally violent, of much longer Duration, and it is feared much more general than that of the last Year. It commenced about Six o'Clock in the Evening of Saturday the 27th ult. and continued, with very little Intermission, during the greatest Part of the Night. The Damage sustained by the Inhabitants has been immense, and must be the more severely felt by them, as they had not recovered the heavy Losses occasioned by the last. The Island was fortunately full of Provisions, which were selling at a low Price; and, to prevent the Exportation of them, an Embargo has been laid upon the Shipping for Six Weeks.

The other Person is about Thirty-six Years of Age, Five Feet Six or Seven Inches high, thin made, his Face red, wears his own Hair, and is supposed to be dressed in a dark-coloured Coat. They had both the Appearance of Farmers, and were seen in London the Evening of the Robbery.
