Dublin Cafle, October 26.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of His Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, in the Morning the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower : At Noon the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majefty's Park the Phoenix were fired Three Rounds, and an-Park the Phoenix were fired I free Rounds, and an-fwered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrifon, which were drawn up in the Royal Square at the Barracks. In the Evening a Play was given by Or-der of His Grace the Lord Lieutenant for the En-tertainment of the Ladies; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

The Letters are intended to be fent out regularly from hence between the Hours of Nine and Ten in the Morn-

ing, fo as to reach the most diftant Parts of the Town by Twelve at Noon.

It is neceffary that all Newspapers should be put into this Office before Six o'Clock, otherwife they cannot be certain of an immediate Conveyance.
