And to Exeter, by Way of Wells, Bridgewater, and Taunton, from the Swan with Two Nicks, Lad-lane, and the Gloucester Coffee-house, Piccadilly.

THE Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs having, in pursuance of the Act passed last Session of Parliament, for the better Securing the Duties payable on Tobacco, agreed to hire of Sir Peter Burrell the Two uppermost Births or Tiers at the Chains at Iron Gate, for the Purpose of mooring such Tobacco Ships as may arrive in the Port of London from and after the 1st Day of January, 1786;—

The said Commissioners do hereby give Notice to all Merchants, Owners, Masters, Pilots, and others concerned, that, in pursuance of the said Act, all Vessels wholly or partly laden with Tobacco, which may arrive in this Port, from and after the said 1st Day of January next, are required to moor in the said Births or Tiers accordingly, and not to depart therefrom until regularly cleared by the proper Officer or Officers of His Majesty's Customs, under a Penalty of Fifty Pounds. And the several Owners and Masters of the Vessels now moored in those Births or Tiers (except Tobacco Ships) are hereby required to remove such Vessels therefrom, so that they may not impede or interrupt any Ship laden or partly laden with Tobacco, from coming to the said Chains after the before-mentioned Period, as no other than Tobacco Ships can legally be suffered to remain at those Places after that Time.
