Whitehall, January 21.

THE King has been pleased to grant to Robert Williams, of Trinity College, Cambridge, Esq; and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to take and use the Surname and bear the Arms of Rich, in Compliance with the Wishes of the late Sir Robert Rich, Bart. deceased, such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office; and also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

St. James's, January 18.

This Day the Baron de Kutzleben had a Private Audience of His Majesty, to deliver his new Letters of Credence, giving him the Character of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from his Serene Highness the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel.

To which he was introduced by the Marquis of Carmarthen, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Vienna, January 4.

The Letters are intended to be sent out regularly from hence between the Hours of Nine and Ten in the Morning, so as to reach the most distant Parts of the Town by Twelve at Noon.

It is necessary that all Newspapers should be put into this Office before Six o'Clock, otherwise they cannot be certain of an immediate Conveyance.
