Hamburgh, Jan. 28. All the difcourse here at prefent, is of the great Victory obtained by the Suedes in Rugen, having totally defeated between 6 and 7000 Danes, of whom none (except fomé few Officers, who got away in Boats) escaped, being all killed or taken Prisoners; the number of the lait is much the greatest, and exceeds even that of the Suedes whole Body. This success will give great life to the Suedes Affairs in those Parts, which were seemingly reduced to the last extremity; and befides we are affured from Danizick, that the Suedes Army in Livouriz begun its march the 3d inftan.

Colague, Jan. 28. The Duke of Newburg shath demanded a very great Sum of money of the States of his Country, for the maintaining the Troops which he has already on foot, as well as for the repairing the Fortifications of Juliers, and other places. We are told the Duke and Dukehels of Newburg are going for Vienna, to vifit the Empreis their daughter. These Magilitrates have not yettaken any final-refolution in the matter of the 400 cq. Crowns themanded of them by the Duke of Newburg in lieu of their giving Winter-quarters to the Imperial Troops.

Bruffele, Jun. 18. The Enemy continues about Grammons with 12 Battalions of Foot, and a Body of Horfe; another Body of them is about Cambron, and a third at Binch; to which laft place 20 pieces of great Cannon were brought the other day from Charler og. Thofe Troops about Grammont ravage the whole Countrey towards Dendermond and Animerp, command great numbers of Cattle from the feveral Villages, and carry away all their Corn and Forage, which they fay fhall be allowed for out of their Contributions. They have done this to Englism, Ninoue, and Alaft; from the laft of which places, they have required Somo-Sactr of Corn. At the fame time they keep their Piopeers together at Aesh, and continue to make great preparations, as if they intended a Siege. The Prince of Yaudemont returned bither the laft night with his Volunteers from Mons. Laft night Monfieur Dickfield arrived here from the Hague.

Ditto, Jan. 21. The French have hitherto continud to fend out Parties from Grammont, to fetch in all the Corn and Forage they can find in the Countrey, not fparing Monasteries, but obliging them to deliver all that was sheltered with them, leaving them nothing but what was for their proper use. This day at noon we had notice that the French were decamped from Grammint, and marched towards Flanders, upon no other defign, as we suppose, than to ruine the Countrey, that nothing may be left in any part for an Army to fublift : And we much fear that when they can no longer fubfift on this fide the Schelde, they will pass over into the Pay's de Waes, and fo finish the destruction of the whole Countrey, Monsieur Dickfield is returned in great hafte to the Hague, in the States Yacht that brought him, having had feveral clofe Conferences with his Excellency, who expects him back again the next week

Ditto; fan. 25. We have nothing of publick News to communicate fince the haft, the Enemy being retired into their Garifons. Here has lately happed a Duel between Don Francisco Marcos de Velasco Lieuenant General, and Don Juan de Velasco Major of Horse, who prefumed to fend his General a Challenge, delivered by Don Medrano a Serjeant General of Bataille, and Governor of Nemport, who was Second to the Major; and Orkia. Matter of the Horse to his Excellency, was Second to Don Francisco Marcos de Velasco; the Major is forely wounded in the Throat, and Orkia in the Leg 3 which coming to his Excellencies knowledges he immediatly put them into the hands of Juilice. D.Fr. Marcos' de Velasco was fent to Astwerp Caffle, Medrano to the Caffle of Gaunt, the other two to two Prifons' in this Town, and it's believed the Major will be exemplarily punished, for prefuming to Challenge his General. This afternoon Sidney Godolfin Elq;Envoy Extraordinary from His Majefty of Great Britain, arrived here, and this evening had Audience of the Duke de Villa Hermola.

The Exception was done privately in the Prifon, and not known till afterwards, to prevent the Addresses that might be made in his behalf; this being the firth Act in that kind that, harh been executed upon a Spaniard within this Governments Ie is faid his Excellency has allo molved not to permit the others concerned in that Duch, to have their Eiberty, or execute their Charges, without a special Gommand from his Majefty.

Hague, Fan. 30. The States General bave finally made a determination in the matters in difference between Groningen and he Ommelanden, viz, that the Sieur Rengers ( whof imprisonment by those of Gran ningen hath been the caufe of all thefe troubles ) thalk be fer at liberty, and reitored to his Honour, Places and Employments. That neither the faid Sieur Rengers, or any other, shall be called in question for what is pasts That foloon as the faid Rengers is at liberty, the longrate Government fail deafe, and the Stadtholder, fhall call an Affembly of the States of the Province to fettle matters, and to reftore all things to the fame flase they were in before these present differences were set on foot. This morning the Prince of Orange went hence to Soeftdyke. From Elanders as well as from France they write, that the French King was going for Germany, and that according to all appearances, we should very fuddenly hear of a very confiderable enterprize on that fide.

Park, Febr. 2. This day the King was at the Palace Royal, to take his leave of Madamoifelle, and it was faid that his Majefly would part to morrow from St. Germains; but we are at prefent affured that the King has deferred his journey till Monday next, which he will then take towards Germany.
