**T**HIS Day the Parliament having met according to Prorogation, his Grace the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, George Bernard, Esq; Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Grace to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend his Grace in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Grace made the following Speech:

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

It is with great Satisfaction that, in Obedience to His Majesty's Commands, I meet you again in Parliament. You will, I am persuaded, give your utmost Attention to the various Objects of Public Concern, which require your Consideration. Your natural Solicitude for the Welfare of Ireland, and a just Sense of Her real Interests, will direct all your Deliberations, and point out to you the Line of Conduct which may be most conducive to the Public Advantage, and to that lasting Connection between the Sister Kingdoms, so essential to the Prosperity of both.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

I have ordered the Public Accounts and other necessary Papers to be laid before you. The Principle which you so wisely established, of preventing the Accumulation of the National Debt, will, I hope, appear

already to have proved successful; and I entertain no Doubt that your Wisdom will persevere in Measures which in their Operation promise such beneficial Effects. His Majesty relies with Confidence upon your Grant of such Supplies as are necessary for the Public Service, and for the honourable Support of His Government.

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

A systematic Improvement of the Police, and a vigorous Execution of the Laws, are essential, not only to the due Collection of the Public Revenue, but to the Security of Private Property, and indeed to the Protection of Society. The frequent Outrages, which have been committed in some Parts of the Kingdom, will particularly call your Attention to this important Object.

It is unnecessary for me to recommend the Protestant Charter Schools to your Protection, or to enumerate the happy Effects which may be derived from your continued Attention to the Linen and other Manufactures, to the Agriculture, and to the Fisheries of the Kingdom; and to such Measures as may animate the Industry, extend the Education, and improve the Morals of the People.

It will ever be my Ambition to promote the real Interests of Ireland; and to contribute, by all the Means in my Power, towards establishing its future Prosperity on the surest and most lasting Foundation.

In exerting our utmost Efforts for the Happiness of this Country we are animated by your Majesty's Illustrious Example: We feel the many Blessings of your mild and auspicious Government, and we entreat your Majesty graciously to accept the Acknowledgments of heart-felt Gratitude, and our ardent Wishes that your Reign may be long, happy, and glorious.

“ Mr. Taylor If you dont discharge James Hobson from the House of Correction we will burn your House about your Ears for we have sworn to stand by one another and you must immediately give over any more Mashen Work for we are determined there shall be no more of them made use of in the Trade and it will be madness for you to contend with the Trade as we are combined by Oath to fix Prices we can afford to pay him a Guinea Week and not hurt the fund if you was to keep him there till Dumsday therefore mind you comply with the above or by God we will keep our Words with you we will make some rare Bunfires in this Countey and at your Peril to call any more Meetings mind that we will make the Mofney Pepel shake in their Shoes we are determined to destroy all Sorts of Mashens for Printing in the Kingdom for there is more hands then is work for so no more from the ingerd Gurnemen Rember we are a great number sworn nor you must not advertise the Men that you say run away from you when your il Usage was the Cause of their going we will punish you for that our Meetings are legal for we want nothing but what is honest and to work for selvs and familers and you want to starve us but it is better for you and a few more which we have marked to die then such a Number of Pore Men and there famerles to be starved.”
