**W**HEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that on Friday the 27th Day of January last, about Seven o'Clock in the Evening, some Person unknown knocked at the Door of the Dwelling-house of Mr. Gee, of Hendon, Farmer, and upon its being opened, Five Men, armed with Pistols and Cutlasses, rushed in, knocked down Mr. Gee and a Man Servant then in the House, inhumanly cut and wounded Mr. Gee in his Head and Arms, fired a Pistol at him, which fortunately missed, nearly cut off one of the Servant's Fingers, and proceeded to rob and plunder the House of what Plate and Money they could find: That the Number of Villains concerned in this daring Outrage is supposed to be Eight or Ten, and that they had a Hackney Coach and a Cart waiting near the House.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the audacious Outrage and Robbery above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them

(except the Person who actually fired the Pistol) who shall discover his Accomplices therein, so that they or any Two of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

**T**HE Commissioners appointed to carry into Execution an Act of Parliament passed in the Eleventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for consolidating, &c. the several Acts of Parliament for Paving, Cleansing, and Lighting the City of London and Liberties thereof, do hereby give Notice, that they will meet in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall, on Tuesday the 7th Day of March next, at Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, to let, by public Auction, a Lease for One Year from Lady-Day next, of the Tolls directed by the said Act to be paid before any Cattle or Carriage shall be permitted to pass on a Sunday through any or either of the Turnpikes hereafter mentioned, or through any Turnpike to be erected by Virtue of the said Act, or any other Act or Acts of Parliament near the same; viz.

- The Turnpike at Mile End.
- The Turnpike at Bethnal Green.
- The Turnpike at Hackney.
- The Turnpike at Kingsland.
- The Turnpike at Ball's Pound or Pond, Ifington.
- The Turnpike at Holloway.
- The Turnpike at the End of St. John's-Street.
- The Turnpike at the End of Goswell-Street, and
- The Turnpike on the New Road, commonly called the City Road:

All which Turnpikes are in the County of Middlesex, (that is to say) for every Coach, Chariot, Berlin, Chaise, Chair, Calash, or other Carriage drawn by Six or more Horses or Mules, the Sum of Ten-pence: For every Coach, Chariot, Berlin, Chaise, Chair, Calash, or other Carriage, drawn by Four Horses or Mules, the Sum of Eight-pence: For every Coach, Chariot, Berlin, Chaise, Chair, Calash or other Carriage, drawn by Three or Two Horses or Mules, the Sum of Six-pence: For every Chaise, Chair, Calash, or other Carriage, drawn by One Horse or Mule, the Sum of Three-pence: And for every Horse, Mule or Ass, not drawing,
