Westminster, March 3, 1786.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land Tax, to be raised in Great Britain, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-six.

An Act for continuing and granting to His Majesty certain Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-six.

An Act for further continuing, for a limited Time, an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America, and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States; and for further continuing, for a limited Time, an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to extend the Powers of an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty, for giving His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the United States of America, to the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British Colonies and Plantations in America, with respect to certain Articles therein mentioned.

An Act for confining, for a limited Time, the Trade between the Ports of the United States of America and His Majesty's Subjects in the Island of Newfoundland to Bread, Flour, Indian-Corn, and Live Stock, to be imported in none but British-built Ships, actually belonging to British Subjects, and navigated according to Law, clearing out from the Ports of His Majesty's European Dominions, and furnished with a Licence according to the Form hereunto annexed.

An Act to continue an Act, made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act to prohibit, for a limited Time, the Exportation of Hay.

An Act to regulate the Exportation of Hops to Ireland.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act of the Fifth Year of His present Majesty, for repairing, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads leading to and from Crewkerne, in the County of Somerset.

An Act for continuing the Term of an Act, made in the Sixth Year of His present Majesty, for amending, widening, altering, clearing, and keeping in Repair, several Roads leading from the Market Cross in the Town of Wareham, and in Purbeck in the County of Dorset.

And to Four Private Bills.

St. James's, March 3.

This Day His Majesty was pleased to invest the Duke of Hamilton and Brandon with the Ensigns of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle.

His Majesty having signed the several Instruments for that Purpose, which were presented to the Sovereign by Robert Quarne, Esq; Gentleman Usher of the Green Rod, (in the Absence of the Secretary) the Duke was called into the Royal Presence, being preceded by the Duke of Roxburgh and the Earl of Galloway, and supported on each Side by the Duke of Queensberry and Lord Viscount Stormont, George Brodie, Esq; Principal Herald of Scotland, (in Place of the Gentleman Usher of the Green Rod) carrying the Sword of State.

At the Entrance a low Reverence was made; a Second about the Middle; and, on being advanced up to the Sovereign, a Third. The Duke being presented by the Two Senior Knights, and, kneeling down, the Herald drew the Sword, and (kneeling) delivered it to the Sovereign, who thereupon knighted his Grace. The Duke having kissed His Majesty's Hand, Green Rod administered the Oath to his Grace; then Green Rod, having received the Ensigns of the Order, presented the same (kneeling) to the Sovereign upon a Velvet Cushion, who put the Ribbon over the Duke's Left Shoulder; upon which his Grace had again the Honour of kissing His Majesty's Hand. After this the Duke rose up, and making a low Reverence, withdrew in the same Manner as he had entered.

The Ceremony was performed, soon after the Levee, in His Majesty's Closet, several of the Great Officers of the State and Court being present.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, " An Act for further continuing for a limited Time an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America; and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States; and for continuing for a limited Time an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to extend the Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty, for giving His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions, and the Inhabitants of the United States of America, to the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British Colonies and Plantations in America, with Respect to certain Articles therein mentioned." It is enacted, That the said Acts, and all the Matters and Things therein contained, shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April 1786: His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which hath been imported since the 1st Day of January 1786, or shall be hereafter imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in pursuance of His Majesty's Order in Council dated the 8th of April 1785, may, upon the Importer paying down in ready Money the Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy (except as hereinafter excepted) be warehoused under His Majesty's Locks, in such Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of all further Duties due for such Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Rice at the Time it shall have

been or shall be so landed; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Rice into the Ports of London, Bristol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Poole, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock and Port Glasgow, or either of them, in the Manner hereinbefore expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty, until further Order, to enter into Bond for the Payment, as well of the Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy, as of all the further Duties due for such Rice, but without any Allowance for prompt Payment of the said Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy, or any other of the Duties which were formerly payable in ready Money; and that if any Rice, which has been so imported since the 1st Day of January 1786, or shall be hereafter imported during the Continuance of this Order, from the Territories of the said United States, shall be taken within the Time hereinbefore mentioned out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured under His Majesty's Locks, in Manner hereinbefore directed, at any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or at either of the Ports above-mentioned respectively, as the Case may be, to be exported directly from thence, the Bonds which shall be entered into for Payment of the said Duties shall be discharged, in like Manner as Bonds entered into for the Duties upon Tobacco are directed to be discharged by any Act of Parliament in Force: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

Constantinople, January 25.

Sultan Suleiman, the Grand Signior's eldest Son, died of the Small Pox on the 19th Instant. His Funeral was performed the same Evening with the usual Solemnity, attended by all the Ottoman Ministers, and the Chiefs of the Naval and Military Establishments.

The Plague continues with little Variation at Smyrna. It has rather increased here in the last Fortnight; and the Intelligence from Wallachia mentions that it is making a considerable Progress in that Country.

Vienna, February 18.

The Emperor has promoted Lieutenant-Generals Bender, Botta, Riese and Langlois to the Rank of General. The latter takes the Command of the Troops in Styria, in the Room of General Riese. Four Major-Generals are also raised to the Rank of Lieutenant-General, and Four Colonels to that of Major-General.

Baron Schonfeld, the new Saxon Envoy to this Court, arrived here Yesterday.
