P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for further continuing for a limited Time an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America; and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States; and for continuing for a limited Time an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to extend the Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty, for giving His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions, and the Inhabitants of the United States of America, to the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British Colonies and Plantations in America, with Respect to certain Articles therein mentioned," It is enacted, That the said Acts, and all the Matters and Things therein contained, shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April 1786: His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which hath been imported since the 1st Day of January 1786, or shall be hereafter imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in pursuance of His Majesty's Order in Council dated the 8th of April 1785, may, upon the Importer paying down in ready Money the Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy (except as hereinafter excepted) be warehoused under His Majesty's Locks, in such Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of all further Duties due for such Rice,

within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Rice at the Time it shall have been or shall be so landed; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Rice into the Ports of London, Bristol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Poole, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock and Port Glasgow, or either of them, in the Manner hereinbefore expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty, until further Order, to enter into Bond for the Payment, as well of the Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy, as of all the further Duties due for such Rice, but without any Allowance for prompt Payment of the said Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy, or any other of the Duties which were formerly payable in ready Money; and that if any Rice, which has been so imported since the 1st Day of January 1786, or shall be hereafter imported during the Continuance of this Order, from the Territories of the said United States, shall be taken within the Time hereinbefore mentioned out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured under His Majesty's Locks, in Manner hereinbefore directed, at any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or at either of the Ports above-mentioned respectively, as the Case may be, to be exported directly from thence, the Bonds which shall be entered into for Payment of the said Duties shall be discharged, in like Manner as Bonds entered into for the Duties upon Tobacco are directed to be discharged by any Act of Parliament in Force: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That on Sunday the 26th Day of February last, between Nine and Ten o'Clock in the Evening, George Tantt, Coachman to Laurence Holker, Esq; of the Parish of Bexley in the County of Kent, having driven his said Master Home from a Neighbour's House where he had dined, and having put up his Horses in the Stable, which is immediately across the Road, and within a Hundred Yards of his said Master's House, (having a Lanthorn with a lighted Candle in it,) he was, suddenly and without any Words being spoken, shot at; that he just saw a Man fire, but could not perceive whether it was from a Gun or Pistol; that he had no distinct View of the Man so as to know him again. That the Lanthorn was shot from out of his Hand, which he found in the Road the next Morning much shattered; and that upon his crying out "Murder," the Person who shot at him immediately ran away.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in firing at the said George Tantt as abovementioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually fired) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or any one of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
