A^T the Court at St. James's, the 15th of February, 1786, P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majefty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the last Session V of Parliament, intituled, " An A& for fur-ther continuing for a limited Time an A& made " in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His prefent Majelty, intituled, An Act for preventing certain Inftruments from being required from Ships " belonging to the United States of America; and " to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, cer-" tain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majefty's " Dominions and the Inhabitants of the faid United * States ; and for continuing for a limited Time an "Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, initialed, An Act to ex-tend the Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-* third Year of His prefent Majesty, for giving His " Majefty certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His " Majefty's Dominions, and the Inhabitants of the " United States of America, to the Trade and Com-" merce of this Kingdom with the British Colonies " and Plantations in America, with Refpect to cer-" tain Articles therein mentioned," It is enacted, That the faid Acts, and all the Matters and Things therein contained, fhall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April 1786: His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which hath been imported fince the 1st Day of January 1786, or shall be hereafter imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in purfuance of His Majesty's Order in Council dated the 8th of April 1785, may, upon the Importer paying down in ready Money the Duty commonly called the Old Sublidy (except as hereinafter excepted) be ware-houled under His Majefty's Locks, in fuch Ware-houles as thall be approved of for that Purpole by the Commissioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of all further Duties due for fuch Rice, i

within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of fuch Rice at the Time it shall have been or shall be so landed; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Rice into the Ports of London, Bristol, Portfmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Poole, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock and Port Glafgow, or either of them, in the Manner hereinbefore expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty, until further Order, to enter into Bond for the Payment, as well of the Duty commonly called the Old Subfidy, as of all the further Duties due for fuch Rice, but without any Allowance for prompt Payment of the faid Duty commonly called the Old Subfidy, or any other of the Duties which were formerly payable in ready Money; and that if any Rice, which has been so imported fince the 1st Day of January 1786, or shall be hereafter imported during the Continuance of this Order, from the Territories of the faid United States, shall be taken within the Time hereinbefore mentioned out of the Warehouses wherein the fame shall be secured under His Majesty's Locks, in Manner hereinbefore directed, at any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or at either of the Ports above-men-tioned respectively, as the Cafe may be, to be ex-ported directly from thence, the Bonds which shall be entered into for Payment of the faid Duties shall be discharged, in like Manner as Bonds entered into for the Duties upon Tobacco are directed to be discharged by any Act of Parliament in Force : And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Direc-tions herein accordingly.
