- An Act for granting the Sum of Five Thousand Pounds to the Governors of the Foundling Hospital and Workhouse, for the Purposes therein mentioned.
- An Act for granting the Sum of One Thousand Pounds to the Governors of the Hibernian School, for the Support of that Charity.
- An Act for granting the Sum of Five Thousand Pounds to the Dublin Society, for the Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for granting the Sum of Five Thousand Pounds to the Board of First Fruits, for the Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for granting the Sum of Eight Thousand Six Hundred Pounds to the Corporation for the Relief of the Poor in the City of Dublin.

An Act for regulating the Stage in the City and County of Dublin.

His Grace was then pleased to make the following Speech :

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

I HAVE seen, with great Satisfaction, the constant Attention and uncommon Dispatch with which you have gone through the Public Business. I am thereby enabled now to relieve you from further Attendance in Parliament. The Harmony of your Deliberations has given no less Efficacy than Dignity to your Proceedings; and I am confident that you will carry with you the same Disposition for promoting the Public Welfare to your Residence in the Country, where your Presence will encourage the Industry of the People, and where your Example and your Influence will be happily exerted in establishing general good Order and Obedience to the Laws.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

I am to thank you, in His Majesty's Name, for the liberal Supplies which you have given for the Public Service, and for the honourable Support of His Majesty's Government. They shall be faithfully applied to the Purposes for which they were granted. My Reliance upon your decided Support to the Execution of the Laws for the just Collection of the Public Revenue, affords me the best founded Hope, that the Produce of the Duties will not fall short of their estimated Amount.

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

The determined Spirit with which you have marked your Abhorrence of all lawless Disorder and Tumult, hath, I doubt not, already made an useful Impression; and the salutary Laws enacted in this Session, and particularly the Introduction of a System of Police, are honourable Proofs of your Wisdom, your Moderation, and your Prudence.

His Majesty beholds, with the highest Satisfaction, the Zeal and Loyalty of His People of Ireland; and I have His Majesty's express Commands to assure you of the most cordial Returns of His Royal Favour and Paternal Affection.

I have the deepest Sense of every Obligation to confirm my Attachment to this Kingdom; and it will be the constant Object of my Administration, and the warmest Impulse of my Heart, to forward the Success of her Interests, and to promote the Prosperity of the Empire.

We take this Opportunity to give You this warning of Your danger for Your behaviour in breaking the prices of the poors work and if You do not amend Your ways and put on what You have unjustly taken of the wages, we are determined that within the Space of One Month upwards of One hundred of us have made an Oath and entred into a Bond that if you do not retrac from what You have done that we will set Your warehouse in fire about your ears and for Yourself wherever we can find You and Your Accomplices we shall make you suffer for what You have done and likeways we hear in the Newspapers that You and Your combined begerly Crew are designed to oppose the operative Weavers but because You think if that pass into a Law Youd be prevented from breaking the Prices by reason the workmen will not be so plenty, likeways we hear whenever any person Complains of his prices to his Master they will tell him to go to Mulrie sword or Bartholemews Warehouse and see there regulations that they are less by this we learn that You Damn'd Rascalls are always the first to break the prices so by this if You have any regard for Your safety You will take Warning both Your and Your Accomplices You Loufy Rougues that comes from nothing and wants to make rich but we will soon deprive You of that for we are designed to put in execution what what we have sworn so take warning Mulrie Sword Bartholemew Sweet Dennisoan Crum and all You that has the most active hand in so doing.
