St. James's, June 2, 1786.

A Chapter of the Most Noble Order of the Garter having been summoned to meet this Day, the Knights Companions, with the Officers of the Order hereafter mentioned, all in their Mantles, attended the Sovereign in His own Apartment, and being called over by Garter King of Arms, a Procession was made from thence to the Great Council-Chamber in the following Order, Garter going no further than the Door, not having been sworn.

Marquis of Stafford
 Duke of Grafton
 Duke of Montagu
 His Royal Highness of Prince of Wales
 Black Rod — Register — Garter
 Chancellor — Prelate
 The SOVEREIGN.

The Sovereign and Knights Companions being seated, Black Rod acquainted the Sovereign, that Isaac Heard, Esq; Garter Principal King of Arms, attended at the Door, and humbly prayed to be admitted to take the Oath of Office, as Chief Officer of Arms of that Most Noble Order; and Garter being introduced in his Mantle by Black Rod, and kneeling down near the Sovereign, the Oath was administered to him by the Chancellor, Black Rod holding the Book. Garter being sworn, rose up, and making Obedience to the Sovereign, immediately knelt down again close to His Majesty, and Black Rod presenting the Chain and Badge on his Knee, His Majesty put the same about Garter's Neck, and at the same Time was graciously pleased to confer on him the Honour of Knighthood. Garter then kissing the Sovereign's Hand, withdrew to his Place.

The Chancellor then read a new Statute, signed by His Majesty as Sovereign of the Order, and countersigned by the Chancellor, by which it is ordained, that the Order shall in future consist of the Sovereign and Twenty-five Knights, exclusive of the Sons of His Majesty or His Successors, who have been elected or shall be elected Knights of the same Most Noble Order.

The Chancellor then signified to the Chapter the Sovereign's Pleasure for filling up the vacant Stalls. Garter and Black Rod were sent to conduct His

Royal Highness Prince Ernest-Augustus; His Majesty's Fifth Son, to the Sovereign, who, being knighted by His Majesty with the Sword of State, kissed the Sovereign's Hand and withdrew. In like Manner Their Royal Highnesses the Princes Augustus-Frederick and Adolphus-Frederick, His Majesty's Sixth and Seventh Sons, were severally knighted. After which Henry Duke of Beaufort and George Marquis of Buckingham were successively knighted with the same Ceremonies.

The Chapter then proceeded to the Election; and the Suffrages being collected by the Chancellor, and presented to the Sovereign, His Royal Highness Prince Edward; His Majesty's Fourth Son (now out of the Kingdom) was declared duly elected.

And the Chapter proceeding to further Election; Their Royal Highnesses Prince Ernest-Augustus, Prince Augustus-Frederick, and Prince Adolphus-Frederick, His Serene Highness the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, with the Duke of Beaufort, Marquis of Buckingham, and Charles Earl Cornwallis, (who had been knighted previous to his Departure from England) were severally elected with the like Ceremonies. His Royal Highness Prince Ernest-Augustus was then received at the Door of the Chapter-Room by the Two Junior Knights, and conducted between them to the Sovereign, preceded by Garter, bearing the Ensigns on a Cushion, and Black Rod.

Garter presenting the Garter to the Sovereign, His Majesty, assisted by the Two Senior Knights, buckled it on His Royal Highness's Left Leg, the Chancellor reading the Admonition.

Garter then presented the Ribbon with the George to the Sovereign; and His Royal Highness kneeling down, the Chancellor reading the Admonition, the Sovereign, with the Assistance of the Two Senior Knights, put it over His Royal Highness's Shoulder; and His Royal Highness having kissed His Majesty's Hand, and severally saluted the Knights present, withdrew.

In the same Manner Their Royal Highnesses Prince Augustus-Frederick and Prince Adolphus-Frederick were severally invested; and, having kissed His Majesty's Hand, also withdrew.

After which the Duke of Beaufort and the Marquis of Buckingham, being received at the Door of the Chapter-Room by the Two Junior Knights, were severally conducted between them to the Sovereign, and

and being invested, with the usual Ceremonies, kissed His Majesty's Hand; and, having saluted the Knights present, withdrew.

The Chapter being ended, Garter called over the Knights, and a Procession was made back to the King's Closet in the same Order as before.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That in the Evening of Monday the 21th Day of April last past, between Eight and Nine o'Clock, as James Hoffack the Elder, James Hoffack the Younger, James Lindsay, and James Mac William, all Officers of His Majesty's Revenue of Excise, were returning Home, after having that Day, in the Course of their Duty, and in Company with the Officiating Supervisor and Two other Officers of Excise, seized Seven private and unlicensed Stills, with a Parcel of Aquovita, and discovered upwards of Eighty Bushels of Malt privately making and concealed, they the said Hoffacks, Lindsay and Mac William were fired upon from a Wood on the Side of the Road betwixt Chappletown of Killychaffy and Pitcastle, in the Parish of Logierait and County of Perth in Scotland, by some Person or Persons unknown; and the said Lindsay, Hoffack the Younger, and Mac William, Officers, were all, at the same Instant, wounded, and fell, the said James Hoffack the Younger having upwards of Forty Small Shot lodged in his Head and Body, one of which went through his Cheek, and tore out one of his Teeth; the said James Lindsay being much wounded in the Shoulder, and having had a Shot quite through his Nose; and the said James Mac William having had a Number of Shot lodged in his Thigh and Body, one of them very dangerous, being a little above the Groin: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in this daring Attempt and Outrage, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Offenders (except the Person who actually fired upon the Officers) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices, so that one or more of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
