WHEREAS it hath been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that the Place appointed by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 8th of July, 1772, for Performance of Quarantine by Ships or Vessels bound to the Ports of Plymouth, Exeter, and Poole, (except such as are bound to the Ports of Padstow or *St. Ives*, being Members of the said Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter) is become very inconvenient, by reason of the Number of His Majesty's Ships in Ordinary now lying in the Harbour of Hamoaze: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby order, that all such Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Plymouth, Exeter, and Poole, or any of the Members or Creeks or other Places within the said Ports of Plymouth, Exeter, and Poole, (except such Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned) shall, in like Manner as all Ships and Vessels, which are or may be bound to the Port of Falmouth, perform their Quarantine at a Place called *St. Ives Pool*, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; and that all Goods imported on Board such Ships shall be aired at the said Place called *St. Ives Pool*, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth.—And the Right Honorable the Lords

Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
