HIS Day the Lords being met; a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by wirtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Pages, to hear the Commission read; and the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commission, impowering His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and feveral other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was read ccordingly, and the Royal Affent given to

An Ast to discontinue, for a limited Time, the several Duties payable in Scotland upon Low Wines and Spirits, and upon Worls, Wash, and other Liquors there used in the Distillation of Spirits; and for granting to His Majesty other Duties in Lieu thereof.

An Act to enable the East India Company to raise Money by a Sale of Annuities, and by increasing their Capital Stock.

An Act for defraying the Charge of the Militia, in that Part of Great Britain called England, for One Year, beginning the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One

Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-six.

An Act for the further preventing Frauds and Abuses attending the Payment of Wages, Prize Money, and other Allowances due for the Service of Petty Of-ficers and Seamen on Board any of His Majesty's

An Act for repealing so much of Two Acts, passed in the Fourteenth and Twenty-first Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, as prohibits the Exportation of Wool Cards of a limited Price.

An Ast for further continuing certain Asts therein mentioned relating to the further Punishment of Person going armed or disguised, in Defiance of the Laws of Customs or Excise; and to the preventing the committee of France by Rankrupts. ting of Frauds by Bankrupts.

An Ast to review, continue, and amend so much of an Ast, made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, initialed, An Ast for allowing a Bounty on the Exportation of British-made Cordage, and for discontinuing the Drawbacks upon Freign
