# Westminster, July 11.

HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, feated on the Throne with the ufual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Ufher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Meffage from His Majefty to the Houfe of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Affent to

An Aft for fettling and fecuring a certain Annuity for the Ufe of Lady Maria Carlton, Wife of Sir Guy Carlton, Knight of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, and Guy Carlton and Thomas Carlton, Sons of the faid Sir Guy Carlton, in Confideration of the emi-nent Services performed by him to His Majefy and this Cardton Country

An Act to discontinue, for a limited Time, the Payment of the Duties upon Low Wines and Spirits for Home Confumption, and for granting and fecuring the due Payment of other Duties in lieu thereof, and for the better Regulation of the making and vending British Spirits, and for difcontinuing for a limited Time cer-tain Imposts and Duties upon Rum and Spirits imported from the West Indies.

An Ast to enable His Majesty to grant a certain Annuity to Brook Watson, Esq; late Commission Gene-ral in North America, in Consideration of his diligent and meritorious Services in that Office.

An Act to limit a Time for the Repayment of the Duties on Male Servants and Carriages by the Commillioners of Excife, and also on Horses, Waggons, Wains and Carts, by the Commillioners of Stamps, and for the Amendment of feveral Laws relating to the Duties under the Management of the Commiffioners of Excife.

An Act for appointing Commifficuers to enquire into the State and Condition of the Woods, Forefts, and Land Revenues belonging to the Crown, and to fell or alienate Fee Farm and other unimproveable Rents.

An AEt to restify a Mistake in an AA, made in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An AA for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Sinking Fund, and for applying certain Monies therein mentioned for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-fix, and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Seffion of Parliament.

An Act to explain, amend and extend to other Tools and Utenfils, An Act made in the Twenty-fifth Year of ohe Reign of His preferit Majefty, intituled, An Activo prohibit the Exportation to Foreign Parts of Tools and Utenfils made Ufe of in the Iron and Steel Manufactures of this Kingdom, and to prevent the feducing of Artifi-cers or Workmen employed in thefe Manufactures to go into Parts beyond the Seas.

An Act to explain and amend an Act made in the Seventh Year of His late Majefty's Reign, initialed, An Act to fettle how far Owners of Ships shall be inswerable for the Acts of the Masters or Mariners, and for giving a further Relief to the Owners of Ships.

An Ast for regulating Houses and other Places kept for the Purpole of flaughtering Horfes. And to One Private Bill.

After which His Majefty was pleafed to make the following most Gracious Speech :

## My Lords, and Gentlemen,

CANNOT close this Seffion of Parliament without expressing the particular Satisfaction with which I have observed your diligent Attention to the Public Bufinefs, and the Measures you have adopted for improving the Refources of the Country.

# Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I thank you for the Supplies which you have granted for the Service of the current Year, and for the Provision you have made for discharging the In-cumbrances on the Revenue applicable to the Uses of My Civil Government. The most falutary Effects are to be expected from the Plan adopted for the Reduction of the National Debt; an Object which I confider as infeparably connected with the effential Interests of the Public.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The Aflurances which I continue to receive from Abroad promife the Continuance of general Tranquility.

The happy Effects of Peace have already appeared in the Extension of the National Commerce ; and no Measures shall be wanting, on My Part, which can tend to confirm these Advantages, and to give additional Encouragement to the Manufactures and Induftry of My People.
