Naples, Jan; 18. Though the Duke of Bournons wide hard been obliged to quit the formal fiege of Taprains; yet he continues to batten the Placer from two or three Forts, which he has Irailed for that purpose, though we car hardly hope that he will by that means be able to reduce the place, considering the Success which the Duke de Vivenne hath put into it; and besides, the place is wholly open on the side of the Sea, fothat Vessels pass freely in and out with Provisions and other necessaries. The Inhabitants of Squishazzir have lately killed their Governor, upon some hare usage they had received from him. Here are arrived two Gallies from Palermo, but bring not any news of moment.

Milan, Fan. 26. Our Governor the Prince de Light has received a Supply of 30000 Crowns from Spain, which, it was thought, would have been emiliployed in making of Levies, but the apprehensions we had of an Invasion from the French being now overs these Monies will be employed for other occasions. Venice Jan. 29. The Chevalier Grimany is returned hicker from his Generalship of Dalmatia, and on Mondaylast he was in the Senate to give account of his Commission. By Sea we have Letters from Confantinople, which say, That notwithstanding the great preparations which the Turks seemed to make for the carrying on the War against the Moscovites, the Grand Vizier enclined very much to Peace, for that he finds the publick Treasure very much exhausted, and that it will be a hard matter to raise the Monies which such a War will require. From Sicily we have advice, that the Duke of Baurnonville not having men enough formally to beliege Tuormina, had raised certain Works Pto block it up.

Humburg, Febr 9. We have now feen a very paraticular List of the killed and wounded, as welk as chose taken prisoners in the action of Rugan, by which it appears, that not above 400 were killed, and 5024 takemprisoners, of which 224 were Officers; 12 pieces

& Cahnon, with Morear-pieces with all their appurrenances; 2400 Horses with Saddles Pittols, and Carbines, with a very great quantity of Provisions, were likewife taken, And all this cost the Suedes but one Cornet, one Quartermaster, one Adjutant, 2 Corporals, and between 40 and 50 comm in Soldiers, who were killed; an Adjurant-General, 3 Captains of Horse, 2 Captains of Foot, a Quarter-Maller, 3 Lieutenants, 3 Corners a Corporal, and about 100 common Soldie s wounded.

Basil, Febr. 10. About 15000 French have passed the Rhine a League from this City, and have not onely bornt severat Villages near Rotten, but likewise are fallen into tie Swartwalt; at present they attack the Castle of R tien, which will not be able to hold out long, not having above two days provisions. We apprehend they will accack Brombach and Rhinfelden; In the mean time she Countrey is milerably ruined.

Menty, Febr. 13. The Elector of Saxony hath larely concluded a Treaty with the Duke of Hanouer, of which we know not the confents. The Imperial Troops In these patts have orders to be ready to march upon the least warning. The Elector Palatine is indisposed.

Cologne, Febr. 15. The Magistrates of this City, notwithstanding all the menaces that are made use of against them, have now finally refused to pay the 40000 Crowns demanded of them. Yesterday passed through this City an Extraordinary Courier coming from Viennu, and going to Bensels.

Bruffels, Rebr. 15. We are told from Luxemburg, that the Princess of Chimay is upon her way hither; and that all the Ladies of quality that were there are Exercised to several places, upon the expectation they shave, that Luxemburg will be very fuddenly beliefed. The French Troops are marching from Alface, the Franche Comta, and those parts, towards-the Moselle, to joy nithe French Kiogs Army, wholer defign will now in all appearance difcover it felf in few days.

The French in the new Conquests have made a show, as if they would suddenly enter upon action, the Mareschal de Humieres having summoned in a great many Pioneers and Carriages, but fince, we hear, has difmift them again! Mons continues to be so closely blocked up, that, in all appearance, the first enterprize they undertake will be that Siege. Yesterday the Duke of Neuburg sent an Express hither to acquaint his Excellency, that the Munster Regiments deligned for the re-enforcement of the Garrilon of Luxenburg, define to be excused, being at present at so great a diffance, that they should be put out We are of a condition of acting by fo long a march. cold, that the States General are much diffatisfied with the proceedings of the Bishop of Munster's Troops in Frieztand, where they have blocked up a Cassle be-Janging to the States. Our Letters from Straiburg of the 11th tell us, that the Prench make great incursions into the Marquifate of Baden, that they have burnt the Town, and befreged the Castlerof Rathel, belonging to the Marquis of Baden Dourlach, wherein are 300 Im. perialifte; they have also burnt and pillaged several other finall places, and the Imperialists are not without fear, that Offerburg will be next attackt, Monfieur Menetae having drawn about 15 coo men together

Hague, Febr. 181 The 15 and 16 inflant several Conferences were held with the Ministers of the Allies residing here.
