Naples, Jan. 18. Though the Duke of *Bourbon* vide had been obliged to quit the formal siege of *Taurmina*; yet he continues to batter the Place from two or three Forts, which he has raised for that purpose; though we can hardly hope that he will by that means be able to reduce the place, considering the Success which the Duke de *Vivonne* had put into it; and besides, the place is wholly open on the side of the Sea, so that Vessels pass freely in and out with Provisions and other necessaries. The Inhabitants of *Syllinguzz* have lately killed their Governor, upon some harsh usage they had received from him. Here are arrived two Gallies from *Palermo*, but bring not any news of moment.

Milan, Jan. 26. Our Governor the Prince de *Ligne* has received a Supply of 300000 Crowns from *Spain*, which, it was thought, would have been employed in making of Levies, but the apprehensions we had of an Invasion from the French being now over, these Monies will be employed for other occasions. The Duke of *Guastalla* died here the 18 instant.

Venice, Jan. 29. The Chevalier *Grimaldi* is returned hither from his Generalship of *Dalmatia*, and on Monday last he was in the Senate to give account of his Commission. By Sea we have Letters from *Constantinople*, which say, That notwithstanding the great preparations which the Turks seemed to make for the carrying on the War against the Moscovites, the Grand Vizier inclined very much to Peace, for that he finds the publick Treasure very much exhausted, and that it will be a hard matter to raise the Monies which such a War will require. From *Sicily* we have advice, that the Duke of *Beaumontville* not having men enough formally to besiege *Taurmina*, had raised certain Works to block it up.

Hamburg, Febr. 9. We have now seen a very particular List of the killed and wounded, as well as those taken prisoners in the action of *Rugen*, by which it appears, that not above 400 were killed, and 5024 taken prisoners, of which 224 were Officers; 12 pieces
