IN Pursuance of an Act passed in the present Session of His present Majesty's Reign, intitled, "An Act for ascertaining and collecting the Poor Rates, and for better governing; regulating, maintaining and employing the Poor in the Parish of St. John Southwark in the County of Surrey," The Governors and Directors of the Poor, appointed by virtue of the said Act, will meet at the Vestry Hall on Thursday the 17th Day of August next, at Ten o'Clock in the Forenoon, for the Purpose of receiving Contributions for raising the Sum of One Thousand Pounds, by public Sale of Annuities; to the highest Bidder, to be paid and payable during the natural Life of any Contributor, (or the natural Life of any Person to be nominated by or on the Behalf of any Contributor at the Time of Payment of his or her respective Contribution Money). The Annuities are by the said Act charged and secured upon the Rates or Assessments to be made by virtue thereof; and are payable Quarterly by the Treasurer, free from Land-Tax, and all other Taxes and Deductions whatsoever. No Monies to be advanced on the Life of any Person under the Age of Forty Years, nor will any Sum less than One Hundred Pounds be accepted for the Purchase of any one Annuity, nor is more than Five Hundred Pounds to be advanced upon any one Life.
