St. James's, September 23.

ESTERDAY being the Anniversary of Their Majesties Coronation, there was a numerous and splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment Their Majesties on the Occasion: The Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired at One o'Clock; and in the Evening there were Illuminations and other public Demonstrations of Joy.

We are too sensible of the Blessings we enjoy,

under your Majesty's paternal Care and Government, to view without Alarm so atrocious an Attempt.

Permit us to renew our unfeigned Professions of inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Royal and Illustrious House; and may the same gracious Arm, which has hitherto preserved, long continue to your faithful Subjects a Life so essentially connected with their Civil and Religious Liberties.

May your Majesty reign in the Affections of a free and loyal People, an Example of unaffected Piety and strict Morality, until it shall please the Divine Disposer of all Events to exalt you, full of

Years, to a Crown of Glory.

May your Majesty continue to rule over us for many Years to come, dispensing the Blessings of a mild and gracious Government to all your Majesty's faithful Subjects, and reigning even in a Country of Freedom, at least in this Instance, most absolutely in the Hearts and Affections of all who are committed to your Charge:
