YESTERDAY Evening the Reverend Mr. Gibert, Secretary to the Right Honourable William Eden, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Paris, arrived at the Marquis of Carmarthen's Office, with the Treaty of Navigation and Commerce between His Majesty and the Most Christian King, signed at Versailles on the 26th of last Month, by Mr. Eden, His Majesty's Plenipotentiary, and by the Plenipotentiary of His Most Christian Majesty.

THE Two following Addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Sydney, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been presented to the King: Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Commonalty and Inhabitants of the Borough of Helston, in the County of Cornwall, humbly beg Leave to join the general Voice in thanking Providence for the Preferment of a Life so dear to us.

That your Majesty's Reign may continue undisturbed by the Hand of Insanity or Violence, is the Prayer of your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects.
