YESTERDAY Evening the Reverend Mr. Gibert, Secretary to the Right Honourable William Eden, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Paris, arrived at the Marquis of Carmarthen's Office, with the Treaty of Navigation and Commerce between His Majesty and the Most Christian King, signed at Versailles on the 26th of last Month, by Mr. Eden, His Majesty's Plenipotentiary, and by the Plenipotentiary of His Most Christian Majesty.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Commonalty and Inhabitants of the Borough of Helston, in the County of Cornwall, humbly beg Leave to join the general Voice in thanking Providence for the Preferment of a Life so dear to us.

That your Majesty's Reign may continue undisturbed by the Hand of Infamy or Violence, is the Prayer of your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most faithful, dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Magistrates and Council of the Town of Kilmarnock, in Common Council assembled, beg Leave to address the Throne with our most sincere Congratulations on the late providential Escape made from the daring Attack upon your Majesty's most Sacred Person.

The Attachment and Affection universally manifested by your Majesty's Subjects are established on

the most solid Principles by the Mildness of your Majesty's Government, and are Proofs that the daring and open Attempt could only be made by a Person in a State of Infamy.

May that God, who rules the Universe, preserve your Majesty's Person from such daring Attempts, and that your Reign may be long continued, as a Blessing to your Majesty's Illustrious Family, and the Happiness of all your Majesty's Subjects.
