GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the Fourteenth Day of this instant December: We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said Fourteenth Day of this instant December; to Tuesday the Twenty-third Day of January next: And We have given Order to Our Chancellor of Great Britain to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Twenty-third Day of January next, be held for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgeses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs, of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give Attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said Twenty-third Day of January next.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Sixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-six, in the Twenty-seventh Year of Our Reign.
