A PROCLAMATION,  
RUTLAND.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty hath signified unto us His Royal Pleasure, that the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the Twelfth Day of December instant, be further prorogued to Thursday the Eighteenth Day of January next, 1787, then to sit for the Dispatch of Business: We do therefore publish and declare, that the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is hereby further prorogued to Thursday the Eighteenth Day of January next, 1787, and the same shall be then held at Dublin, and sit for the Dispatch of Business: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament are to take Notice, and to give their Attendance accordingly.

Given at His Majesty's Castle of Dublin, the 6th Day of December, 1786.

GOD Save the KING.

The Body of Sir Horace Mann, late His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary at the Court of Tuscany, (who died at Florence on the 16th Instant) having been embalmed, was conveyed by Water to this Place, and deposited in the National Chapel, in the Consul's House, where it lay in State. The Members of the Factory were forward in shewing every Mark of Honour and Distinction to the Remains of their respected Minister, who for so long a Series of Years had given the utmost Attention to the Protection of the National Commerce, and to the Maintenance of their Privileges. The Funeral Service was performed Yesterday Afternoon, by the Rev. Mr. Hall, Chaplain to the Factory, in the Presence of the British Consul and Gentlemen of the Factory, all the other Foreign Consuls, Travellers of Distinction, Protestant Merchants, Commanders of British Ships, and Subjects of that Nation. The Corps was then

carried in Procession through the Town to the Mole; the Gentlemen all in Mourning, with White Scarfs and Hat-Bands, in the following Order:

The Lieutenant of the Guard.

The British Vice-Consul.

The Body, the Pall borne by Eight Members of the Factory.

Two Clergymen.

Three principal Servants, Mourners.

The British Consul.

Consuls of other Nations, Two and Two.

Gentlemen of the Factory, Two and Two.

Travellers of Distinction, Two and Two.

Protestant Foreign Merchants.

English Captains of Ships, &c. &c. &c.

The Consul's and a Train of other Coaches closed the Procession, the Streets being lined by a Party of Guards.

When the Corps arrived at the Mole, it was placed in the Consul's Barge, covered with the Pall, the Colours hoisted only half Way up (as was the Case all Day on Board the numerous English Ships here) and accompanied by the Vice-Consul was towed off, and embarked on Board the Isabel, Captain Taylor, on her immediate Departure for London.
