A PROCLAMATION.

RUTLAND.

HEREAS His Majefty hath fignified unto us His Royal Pleafure, that the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now ftands prorogued to Tuefday the Twelfth

Day of December inflant, be further prorogued to Thurfday the Eighteenth Day of January next, 1787, then to fit for the Difpatch of Bufinefs: We do therefore publifh and declare, that the faid Parliament be, and accordingly the faid Parliament is hereby further prorogued to Thurfday the Eighteenth Day of January next, 1787, and the fame fhall be then held at Dublin, and fit for the Difpatch of Bufinefs: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this prefeat Parliament are to take Notice, and to give their Attendance accordingly.

Given at His Majesty's Castle of Dublin, the 6th Day of December, 1786.

## Leghorn, November 24.

The Body of Sir Horace Mann, late His Britannick Majefly's Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary at the Court of Tufcany; (who died at Florence on the 16th Inftant) having been embalmed, was conveyed by Water to this Place, and deposited in the National Chapel, in the Conful's Houfe; where it lay in State. The Members of the Eactory were forward in shewing every Mark of Honour and Diffinction to the Remains of their respected Minister, who for so long a Series of Years had given the utmost Attention to the Protection of the National Commerce, and to the Maintenance of their Privileges. The Funeral Service was performed Yesterday Afternoon, by the Rev. Mr. Hall, Chaplain to the Factory, in the Prefence of the British Conful and Gentlemen of the Factory, all the other Foreign Confuls, Travellers of Diffinction, Protestant Merchants, Commanders of British Ships, and Subjects of that Nation. The Corps was then

carried in Procession through the Town to the Mole, the Gentlemen all in Mourning, with White Scarfs and Hat Bands, in the following Order:

> The Lieutenant of the Guard. The British Vice-Conful.

The Body, the Pall borne by Eight Members of the Factory.

Two Clergymen.

Three principal Servants, Mourners. The British Conful.

Confuls of other Nations, Two and Two.

Gentlemen of the Factory, Two and Two.

Travellers of Distinction, Two and Two.

Protestant Foreign Merchants.

English Captains of Ships, &c. &c. &c.

The Conful's and a Train of other Coaches clofed the Procession, the Streets being lined by a Party of Guards.

When the Corps arrived at the Mole, it was placed in the Conful's Barge, covered with the Pall, the Colours holfted only half Way up (as was the Cafe all Day on Board the numerous English Ships here) and accompanied by the Vice-Conful was towed off, and embarked on Board the Isabel, Captain Taylor, on her immediate Departure for London.
