THIS Day being appointed for the Celebration of the Anniversary of the Queen's Birth-day, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment Their Majesties on the Occasion. The Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired at One o'Clock. There was a Ball at Court in the Evening, and Illuminations, and other public Demonstrations of Joy, in London and Westminster.

ONE of the King's Messengers, dispatched by the Right Honourable William Eden, arrived here on Thursday Morning last, with a Convention between His Majesty and the Most Christian King, concerning the Execution of the late Treaty of Navigation and Commerce, which was signed at Versailles on the 15th Instant by Mr. Eden and His Most Christian Majesty's Plenipotentiary.

THE following Address of the Consul-General, the Members of the British Factory, and others of the Island of Madeira, having been transmitted to the Marquis of Carmarthen, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has by him been presented to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, your Majesty's Consul-General of the Island of Madeira, the Members of the British Factory, and others your Majesty's Subjects here residing, humbly presume to approach your Royal Presence with the sincerest Congratulations on your Majesty's providential Escape from the late Attempt on your most Sacred Person.

When the conspicuous Benignity and Royal Virtues of your Majesty's Character are taken into Consideration, when the very Act which afforded an Opportunity for the atrocious Attempt was an Instance of your Majesty's invariable Condescension and paternal Regard to the Petitions of even the meanest of your Subjects, there could be no Hesitation in attributing to Infamy, what Investigation has, in Fact, found to be its Offspring.

But though the Attempt did proceed from Infamy, yet as it might have proved in the Event no less fatal to your Majesty's most precious Life, than pregnant with Misfortune and Distress to your faithful and affectionate Subjects, amongst which Description we venture to claim no secondary Rank, though in other Respects little important, and far removed from the immediate Influence of your Majesty's benign Government, we cannot refrain from expressing the Effusions of our Loyalty by this humble, but sincere Address.

That your Majesty may long enjoy all human Felicity, and reign with uninterrupted Prosperity over a free, a loyal, and an attached People, are the heart-felt Wishes of your Majesty's most dutiful and affectionate Subjects on this Island of Madeira.

He is about Thirty Years of Age, about Five Feet Nine Inches high, of a fallow Complexion, wears a black Tye Wig; his natural Hair, which is beginning to grow out, is also black: He walks ill, owing to his having Corns or tender Feet; was lately dressed in a bluish-grey Coat, a dark Drab Great Coat with Three Capes, and a round Hat covered with Oil-Skin. He absconded from Padstow on Saturday Night the 13th Instant.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen; or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
