## Westminster, January 23.

HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, feated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentle-

man Ulher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Meffage from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majefty was pleafed to make the following most Gracious Speech :

#### My Lords, and Gentlemen,

Have particular Satisfaction in acquainting you, that, fince I last met you in Parliament, the Tranquillity of Europe has remained uninterrupted, and that all Foreign Powers continue to express their

friendly Difpolition to this Country. I have concluded a Treaty of Navigation and Commerce with the Moft Christian King, a Copy of which shall be laid before you. I must recommend it to you to take fuch Measures as you shall judge proper for carrying it into Effect; and 1 trust you will find that the Provisions contained in it are calculated for the Encouragement of Industry, and the Extension of lawful Commerce in both Countries, and, by promoting a beneficial Intercourse between our respective Subjects, appear likely to give additional Permanence to the Bleffings of Peace. I shall keep the fame falutary Objects in View, in the Commercial Arrangements which I am negociating with other Powers.

I have also given Directions for laying before you a Copy of a Convention agreed upon between Me and the Catholick King, for carrying into Effect the Sixth Article of the last Treaty of Peace.

Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons, I have ordered the Effimates for the prefent Year to be laid before you, and I have the fulleft Reliance on your Readiness to make due Provision for the feveral Branches of the Publick Service.

The State of the Revenue will, I am perfuaded, continue to engage your conftant Attention, as being effentially connected with the National Credit, and the Prosperity and Safety of My Dominions.

My Lords, and Gentlemen, A Plan has been formed, by My Direction, for transporting a Number of Convicts, in order to remove the Inconvenience which arole from the crouded State of the Goals, in different Parts of the Kingdom; and you will, I doubt not, take fuch further Measures as may be necessary for this Purpole. I truft you will be able, in this Seffion, to carry

into Effect Regulations for the Eafe of the Merchants,

and for fimplifying the Publick Accounts, in the various Branches of the Revenue; and I rely upon the uniform Continuance of your Exertions in Purfuit of fuch Objects as may tend still further to improve the National Refources, and to promote and confirm the Welfare and Happiness of My People.

\*HIS Day the Parliament having met according to Prorogation, his Grace the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the ufual Solemnity, George Bernard, Efq; Gentleman Ufher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Meflage from his Grace to the House of Commons, fignifying his Pleafure that they should immediately attend his Grace in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Grace made the following Speech :

#### My Lords, and Gentlemen,

Had hoped that upon the prefent Occasion of meeting you again in Parliament, it would have been in my Power to have announced to you the entire Suppression of those Commotions, which in fome Parts of the Kingdom have diffurbod the general Tranquility. Under the prefent Circumstances, I am perfuaded, by my Confidence in the accustomed Proofs of your Wisdom and Zeal, that I shall receive from you whatever Affiftance may be neceffary for the more effectual Vindication of the Laws, and the Protection of Society. Your uniform Regard for the Rights of all your Fellow Subjects, and your zealous Attachment to the Religious and Civil Conflictutions of your Country, will fimulate your Attention to their infeparable Interefts, and will enfure your especial Support of the Effablished Church and the respectable Situation of it's Ministers.

### Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have directed the proper Officers to lay the National Accounts before you; and I truft you will make the neceffary Provisions for the Exigencies of the State, and the honourable Support of His Majefty's Government.

### My Lords, and Gentlemen,

An Act was passed in the last Session of the British Parliament for the further Increase of Shipping and Navigation. You will, I doubt not, take proper Measures to confirm to this Country a full Participation of it's Advantages. -.

I have

I have the Satisfaction to inform you, by the King's Command, that His Majefty has concluded a Treaty of Navigation and Commerce with the Moft Christian King. A Copy of this Treaty will be laid before you, in which you will not fail to observe the Attention which is paid to the Interests of this Kingdom. And I truft that your Adoption of it bere by fuch Laws as may be requisite to give it Effect, will be attended with real Benefit to the Country, by fuceefsfully encouraging the Efforts of

her Industry and Emulation. The Trade and Manufactures, and particularly the Linen Manufacture of this Kingdom; the Protestant Charter Schools and other Public Institutions for charitable Purpofes, will not fail to engage your conftant Care and Encouragement. And I hope that fome liberal and extensive Plan for the general Improvement of Education, will be matured for an

early Execution. A longer Acquaintance with this Country Itrengthens my anxious Wifnes for it's Welfare. And I shall experience the most fensible Gratification, if in my Administration of the King's Government, I can, with a Succels in any Degree cor-respondent to thole Wishes, accomplish His Majesty's earnest Desire to promote and secure the Happiness and Prosperity of Ireland.
