THE Houses of Lords and Commons having resolved upon humble Addresses to His Majesty, the same, together with Addresses from both Houses to the Lord Lieutenant, were this Day presented to his Grace, and, with his Grace's Answers, are as follow:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament assembled, do most humbly beg Leave to declare our warmest and unfeigned Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person, Family, and Government, and to congratulate your Majesty on your happy Escape from the late desperate and horrid Attempt upon your Sacred Life, the invaluable Importance of which is felt by us, if possible, with a still deeper Impression than ever, expressing at the same Time our Gratitude to Divine Providence, which averted the Stroke, and preserved a Life so dear to your faithful People.

We entreat your Majesty to accept our Thanks for continuing amongst us our present Chief Governor, whose eminent and amiable Qualities have acquired the Esteem and Confidence of this Nation.

We beg Leave to declare our extreme Concern, that the Commotions which have disturbed some Parts of this Kingdom, have not yet subsided; and that when we consider them as violent Combinations against the Laws and Constitution of our Country, and the Rights of our Fellow Subjects, we cannot be blind to their fatal Tendency and Effects as to the Safety and Prosperity of every Individual, and their destructive Consequences to Industry and true Liberty; and that when we behold this Spirit of Outrage more particularly directed against the Established Church and her Ministers, we cannot but be anxious for the Protection of the Protestant Religion, the true and steady Foundation of a Protestant Government.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that you may rely upon it, that with a zealous Attachment to the Religious and Civil Constitutions of our Country, and their inseparable Interests, we will be ready, with the utmost Alacrity, to afford whatever Assistance may be necessary for the effectual Vindication and Execution of the Laws for the Protection of Society, and of the Constitution in general, and especially and particularly for the Support and Maintenance of the Established Church, and the respectable Situation of it's Ministers.

We esteem the Increase of Shipping and Navigation as an Object of peculiar Concern to the Commerce of these Kingdoms, and that we will not omit to take such Measures as may best tend to promote a Matter of such National Importance.

We acknowledge your Majesty's Goodness in communicating to us the Conclusion of a Treaty of Navigation and Commerce with the Most Christian King, and declare that, having so often experienced your Majesty's great Regard to the Interests and Welfare of this Kingdom, we doubt not of their having been attended to on this Occasion; and that, in this Confidence, your Majesty will find us cordially disposed to afford it our best Consideration, and to give it full Effect by proper and adequate Laws. And we trust that when Quiet shall be restored, this Nation will reap the Advantages which that Treaty offers to her Industry and Emulation.

We shall continue to encourage our Trade and Manufactures, and especially the Linen Manufacture; and we will not abate our anxious Care for the Protestant Charter Schools, and other charitable Institutions; and particularly we shall most freely give our Assistance to a liberal and most extensive Plan for the general Improvement of Education as soon as it can be brought to some Maturity.

And we supplicate the Almighty Power to extend to your Majesty a Life replete with every Blessing; and that your Majesty may long enjoy the Happiness of beholding the National Prosperity flourish under your Gracious Auspices, and of receiving the lively Expressions of Affection and Gratitude from the Hearts of your loyal and faithful Subjects.

I Will forthwith transmit this dutiful and loyal Address, to be laid before His Majesty.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens, and Burghesses, in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Ireland, in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to approach your Throne, not only with the constant Declarations of our Attachment to your Royal Person, Family, and Government, but with the most ardent and sincere Congratulations on your Majesty's providential Deliverance from the desperate Effort of a frantic Assassin.

We should be dead to every Sentiment of Loyalty and Gratitude, if we could repress our Solicitude for the Life of a Sovereign, whose Reign has been endeared to us by His distinguished Attention to His Subjects of this Kingdom.

We are affected with the utmost Concern and Indignation at those alarming and violent Outrages, which have so long disgraced a Part of this Kingdom, and which we have in vain hoped would have been extinguished by the vigorous yet temperate Exertions of your Majesty's Government: Convinced, at

the same Time, that no Kingdom can rise to Prosperity but through the Establishment of internal Peace, we are determined to check the Progress of Disorder by every Means in our Power. No Effort of Combination or Force shall divert our decided Resolution to secure the Rights of all our Fellow Subjects, and effectually to maintain the Civil and Religious Constitutions of the State. The Support of the Established Church, and of the respectable Situation of it's Ministers, is an Object of the most essential Importance, and inseparably connected with the Security of all our dearest Interests: We can never, therefore, be wanting either in Attention or Zeal to defend them, by investing your Majesty's Government with every requisite and adequate Authority, relying upon the Prudence and Humanity of a Chief Governor, whose amiable and steady Virtues have entirely engaged our Attachment and Confidence.

We shall cheerfully make the necessary Provisions for the Exigencies of the State, and the honorable Support of your Majesty's Government.

We shall lose no Time in investigating those Advantages which may be derived from our enacting of Laws for the further Increase of Shipping and Navigation.

We humbly offer our Acknowledgments to your Majesty for your gracious Communication of the Treaty of Navigation and Commerce, which your Majesty has concluded with the Most Christian King: We have no Doubt of the Attention, which has been shewn therein, to our particular Situation and Interests; and we must be naturally anxious to adopt any Measure which, by engaging the Nation in new Objects of Emulation and Industry, promises thereby to open another Source of Wealth and Prosperity.

We shall not neglect a judicious Encouragement of our Linen and other Manufactures. The Protestant Charter Schools and other public Institutions for charitable Purposes will command our Attention, and we shall not fail in applying ourselves to the important Object of a general Improvement of Education.

Encouraged in our Endeavours for the Public Good by your Majesty's auspicious Recommendation and Patronage, we shall omit no Exertion in furthering the great Purposes for which we are assembled, and consulting the Glory of your Majesty's Reign by securing the Peace of your Kingdom and exalting it's Prosperity.

Office for Auditing the Public Accounts,
January 26, 1787.

WHEREAS divers Persons, to whom Money has been issued for Public Services, have neglected to deliver into this Office the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, in the Manner, and within the Time prescribed by the Act for better examining and Auditing the Public Accounts of this Kingdom, the Commissioners for Auditing the Public Accounts have directed that Copies of the following Sections of the said Act be inserted in the London Gazette, in order that all Persons to whom Public Money has been, or shall be, so issued, may be informed of the Consequences of such Neglect.

SECTION XVII. And whereas great Losses and Inconveniences have arisen to the Public, by Sub-Accountants not having been put in Charge till a long Time has elapsed after the Monies were issued to them, be it enacted, That the Paymaster-General of His Majesty's Forces, the Treasurer of the Navy, the Treasurer of the Ordnance, and every other Public Officer who shall hereafter pay into the Hands of any Person or Persons whomsoever, Money for Public Services, by Way of Imprest or on Account, shall, within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December, One thousand seven hundred

and eighty-five, and within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December in every future Year, transmit an Account of all Sums of Money issued or paid by him or them to any Person or Persons, for the Public Service, within the preceding Year, to the Commissioners to be appointed under the Authority of this Act; who shall, and they are hereby required forthwith to transmit Duplicates of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall immediately, on Receipt of such Accounts, put the several Sums so issued in Charge against the Parties, in like Manner as now practised with respect to Persons who receive Money by Way of Imprest, and on Account, at the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer.

SECTION XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Times abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

SECTION XX. And be it further enacted and declared, That every Sub-Accountant to whom Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Services, in case the Money so issued shall have been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unless it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months of the usual annual Time of the Determination of each Account respectively; and in case such Monies shall have been issued for Services to be performed in any Part of Europe out of this Kingdom, then the Vouchers shall be delivered within Four Months of the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; if in the West Indies, the Continent of America, or in Africa, within Six Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; and if in the East Indies, within Twelve Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; unless it shall in each and every Case be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury, that the Failure of transmitting the same, within the Periods beforementioned, was unavoidable; in which Case such further Delay may be granted by Warrant under the Hands of the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three of them, as they shall judge reasonable; and in such Cases the Vouchers shall be delivered at the Expiration of the Term of Delay so granted, on Pain, upon Failure in any of the abovementioned Cases, of paying such Fine to His Majesty as the Court of Exchequer, on Application made to them, shall think fit to set and impose; which Fine the said Court is hereby authorized and empowered to set and impose accordingly.

SECTION XXII. Provided always, and be it enacted, that when any Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall transmit to the Commissioners, to be appointed under the Authority of this Act, a sufficient and satisfactory Discharge from the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy, or the Commissioners for Sick and Hurt, for any Monies he or they shall have received in the said Departments severally, the said Commissioners shall transmit a Duplicate

Duplicate of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall forthwith strike out the Name or Names of such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants from the Imprest Roll; and such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall from thenceforth be discharged from any other or further Account for the same.
