HEREAS there was this Day read at the Board, the humble Petition of several Merchants of London, in Behalf of themselves and others trading to Spain, humbly praying, for the Reasons therein contained, that all Ships coming from the Ports of Spain within the Mediterranean, laden with Fruit, Wine, and other Goods not enumerated in the Quarantine Regulations, may, on the same being verified to the Officers of the Customs at the Ports where such Ships may arrive, be freely admitted to Entry without performing Quarantine: His Majesty having taken the faid Petition into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Obstructions upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with the Health and Safety of His Subjects, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Quarantine at present substitting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean be taken off, so far as respects Ships and Vessels coming directly from any of the Ports of the Kingdom of Spain, within the Mediterranean, or from the Island of Minorca, laden with the Products of Spain only; and that all such Ships, and also all Ships and Vessels arriving from the Town or Port of Gi-braltar, be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings without unpacking, opening and airing, and without performing any Quarantine: Provided that the Cargo on board such Ships shall consist entire the Cargo on board such Ships shall consist entire the Cargo on board such Ships shall consist entire the Cargo on board such shall be cargo on the cargo on t tirely of Articles not enumerated in the Orders of Council directing the Performance of Quarantine, except any Bags, Straw, Matting or Platting on Jars, which shall have been folely made Use of as Package for the said non-enumerated Articles: And provided also that they bring with them Clean Bills of Health, and that the Master or other Person taking Charge of fuch Ship or Vessel, do first make Answer, upon Oath, before the Superintendant of Quarantine, or other Person appointed for that Service, to the printed Questions usually put to the Masters of Ships coming from Places from whence Quarantine is required to be performed, and that by the faid Answers, which shall be transmitted by the said Superintendant or other Person appointed to see Quarantine performed, to the Principal Officers of the Customs, or to the Chief Magistrate at the Place to which the Ship is bound, it shall appear, to the Satisfaction of the said | Lincoln's Inn, in the County of Middlesex, Esq;

Principal Officers or Chief Magistrate, that such Ship did not touch at any infected Place, nor had Communication with any infected Ship or Veffel, during the Voyage, and that the Crew is free from Infection.

SECTION XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Times abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person

issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

SECTION XX. And be it further enacted and declared. That every Sub-Accountant to whom Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Services, in case the Money so issued shall have been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unless it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months of the usual annual Time of the Determination of each Account respectively; and in case such Monies shall have been issued for Services to be performed in any Part of Europe out of this Kingdom, then the Vouchers shall be delivered within Four Months of the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; if in the West Indies, the Continent of America, or in Africa, within Six Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; and if in the East Indies, within Twelve Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; unless it shall in each and every Case be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury, that the Failure of transmitting the same, within the Periods beforementioned, was unavoidable; in which Case such further Delay may be granted by Warrant under the Hands of the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three of them, as they shall judge reasonable; and in such Cases the Vouchers thall be delivered at the Expiration of the Term of Delay so granted, on Pain, upon Failure in any of the abovementioned Cases, of paying such Fine to His Majesty as the Court of Exchequer, on Application made to them, shall think sit to fet and impose; which Fine the said Court is hereby authorized and impowered to fet and impose accordingly.

SECTION XXII.
