THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to enable His Majesty to grant a certain Annuity to the Right Honorable Sir John Skynner, Knight, late Lord Chief Baron of His Majesty's Court of Exchequer, in Consideration of his diligent and meritorious Services, and of his faithful and upright Conduct in the Execution of that Office.

An Act to extend the Provisions of an Act made in the Twenty-sixth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, an Act for the more effectual Encouragement of the British Fisheries.

An Act to explain and amend so much of an Act made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of King George the First, intituled, An Act for making perpetual so much of an Act made in the Tenth Year of the Reign of Queen Anne, for the reviving and continuing several Acts therein mentioned, as relates to the Building and Repairing County Goals; and also an Act of the Eleventh and Twelfth Years of the Reign of King William the Third, for the more effectual Suppression of Piracy; and for making more effectual the Act of the Thirteenth Year of the Reign of King Charles the Second, intituled, An Act for establishing Articles and Orders for the regulating and better Government of His Majesty's Ships of War and Forces by Sea, as gives a discretionary Power to Magistrates to commit Vagrants and other Criminals, Offenders, and Persons charged with small Offences, either to the Common Gaol or House of Correction.

An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, the Road leading from the Town of Nottingham to the Town of Mansfield in the County of Nottingham.

An Act for continuing and amending an Act of the Twenty-eighth Year of his late Majesty, so far as the same relates to the Roads from the Hand and Post at the Top of Barford-Lane, in the County of Gloucester,

to Stow on the Wold, and from thence to Paddle Brook, and from the Cross Hands on Salford Hill, in the County of Oxford, to the Hand and Post, in the Parish of Withington, in the County of Gloucester.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act of the First Year of His present Majesty, for repairing the Roads from the City of Gloucester to the Top of Birdlip Hill, and from the Foot of the said Hill to the Top of Crickley Hill.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WH E R E A S by an Act passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for further continuing, for a limited Time, an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America; and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States, and for further continuing, for a limited Time, an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to extend the Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty, for giving His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the United States of America, to the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British Colonies and Plantations in America, with Respect to certain Articles therein mentioned," it was enacted, that the said Acts, and all the Matters and Things therein contained, should continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April, 1787: And whereas by another Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to continue the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, and to render the Provisions thereof more effectual," it is declared to be expedient that the said several Acts beforementioned should be further continued; and it is therefore enacted, that the said several Acts,

and

and all the Matters and Things therein contained, shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April, 1788; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That any Unmanufactured Goods and Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Fish, Oil, Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti) and any Pig Iron, Bar Iron, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Rosin, Pot-Ash, Pearl-Ash, Indico, Masts, Yards and Bowsprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, or in Ships built in the Countries belonging to the United States of America, or any of them, and owned by the Subjects of the said United States, or any of them, and whereof the Master and Three-fourths of the Mariners at least are Subjects of the said United States, or any of them; and may be entered and landed in any Port of this Kingdom, upon Payment of the same Duties as the like Sort of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to if imported in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any British Island or Plantation in America, and no other, notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the same may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law. And it is hereby further ordered, that there shall be the same Drawbacks and Bounties on Merchandizes and Goods exported from Great Britain into the Territories of the said United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law, upon the Exportation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America; and that (until further Order) there shall be allowed and paid the same Drawbacks on the Exportation of any Sort of Foreign Hemp or Foreign Iron, exported from Great Britain into any British Colony or Plantation in America, or into the Territories of the United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Sort of Hemp or Iron, and under the same Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Penalties and Forfeitures in all Respects, as such Drawbacks are allowed and paid, or are subject and liable to by Law, upon the Exportation of such Hemp and Iron into other Foreign Parts.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported, in Manner before-mentioned, upon Payment of the same Duties as Tobacco, imported by British Subjects from any British Colony or Plantation, is or may hereafter be subject to; but under and subject nevertheless to all and singular the Regulations of an Act made and passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for the better securing the Duties payable on Tobacco"

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, That any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in Manner above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down in ready Money, the Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy (except as hereinafter excepted) be

warehoused under His Majesty's Locks, in such Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of all further Duties due for such Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Rice at the Time it shall be so landed: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Rice into the Ports of London, Bristol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Poole, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty, (until further Order) to enter into Bond for the Payment, as well of the said Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy, as of all the further Duties due for such Rice, but without any Allowance for prompt Payment of the said Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy, or any other of the Duties which were formerly payable in ready Money; and that if any Rice, which shall be so imported from the Territories of the said United States, shall be taken within the Time herein before-mentioned out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured under His Majesty's Locks, in Manner herein before directed, at any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or at either of the Ports above-mentioned respectively, as the Case may be, to be exported directly from thence, the Bonds which shall be entered into for Payment of the said Duties shall be discharged, in like Manner as Bonds entered into for the Duties upon Tobacco are directed to be discharged by any Act of Parliament in Force.

And, for the Purpose of regulating the Trade and Commerce between the People and Territories belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in the West Indies, in which Description the Bahama Islands, and the Bermuda or Somers Islands, are included, and the People and Territories belonging to the said United States of America, His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that no Goods or Commodities whatsoever, except Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Hemp and Flax, Masts, Yards and Bowsprits, Staves, Heading, Boards, Timber, Shingles, and all other Species of Lumber; Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, and all other Species of Live Stock and Live Provisions; Peas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, Rice, Oats, Barley, and all other Species of Grain, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the said United States of America; and also Tobacco in the fair and lawful Way of Barter and Traffic, between the People of the said United States and the People of His Majesty's West India Islands, as permitted by the before-recited Act passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, may be imported from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States of America into any of His Majesty's West India Islands, and that the above Goods may, (until further Order) be imported by British Subjects only, and in no other than British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law; and that Rum, Sugar, Melasses, Coffee, Cocoa Nuts, Ginger and Pimento, may (until further Order) be exported by British Subjects, in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any of the said Islands to any Port or Place within the Territories belonging to the said United States, upon Payment of the same Duties on Exportation, and subject to the like Rules, Regulations, Securities and Restrictions, as the same Articles by Law are or may be subject and liable to, if exported to any British Colony or Plantation in America; and the Bonds and Securities heretofore required to be taken

taken for such Ships carrying such Goods shall and may be cancelled and discharged, upon the like Certificates as are required by the said recited Act made in the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, to discharge any Bonds given in Great Britain for the due landing of any other Goods in the Territories belonging to the said United States of America.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that no Goods, Commodities or Merchandize whatsoever, shall be imported from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States into the Provinces of Nova-Scotia or New Brunswick, or their respective Dependencies, except Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, and all other Species of Live Stock and Live Provisions; Peas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, Rice, Oats, Barley, and all other Species of Grain, and also all and every Sort of squared Timber, Scantling, Planks, Boards, Staves, Heading, Boards, Shingles, and Hoops; and that the above Articles shall be imported by British Subjects only, and in none other than British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and during such limited Times only as the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said Provinces, and their respective Dependencies, shall, with the Advice of their respective Councils, by Proclamation, declare the Importation of any of the said Articles to be necessary for the Supply of the Inhabitants of the said Provinces. And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that no Goods, Commodities or Merchandize whatsoever shall be imported from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States into any of the Ports of the Province of Quebec.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Whitehall, January 1.

AS several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have from Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of their late Majesties, King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them.—And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Bras, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase; and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Justice of Peace that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid; such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted upon Indictment of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Bras, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall

shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures or any Part of such Tools, he shall for every Offence forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall for every such Offence forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil or Implement whatsoever used in, or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Linen, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof;— and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures
