FIRST Regiment of Dragoon Guards, Lieutenant Alexander Frazer is appointed to be Captain of a Troop, vice Thomas Cowper Hincks.

Constantinople, March 24.

The unusual Severity of the Frost, which continued, with very little Interruption, from the latter End of December till the 3d Instant, joined to a total Suspension of the Plague for upwards of Thirty Days, induced a Hope that this City and Neighbourhood were at length freed from the Contagion. But it is now apparent that the open moist Weather, which commenced the 3d Instant, though it lasted only till the 10th, has reproduced that Malady, no less than Nine verified Accidents of the Plague having since happened in the Greek Village of St. Dimitri, very near Pera: So that there is great Reason to apprehend that the Contagion will again spread on the Return of warm Weather.
