Staffordshire Militia.

IN pursuance of an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for amending and reducing into one Act of Parliament, the Laws relating to the Militia in that Part of Great Britain called England, and by Virtue of the Powers thereby vested in me as Lord-Lieutenant of the County of Stafford, I do order and appoint that the Militia of the said County of Stafford shall meet and assemble at the City of Lichfield, in the said County, on the 28th of May instant, and be there trained and exercised for the Space of Twenty-eight Days together, according to the Directions of the said Act of Parliament.

Lately published at His Majesty's Printing-Office, near Gough-square, Fleet-street; where also may be had, singly, any Act passed in this or any preceding Session of Parliament.

AN ACT for repealing the several Duties of CUSTOMS and EXCISE, and granting other Duties in lieu thereof, and for applying the said Duties, together with the other Duties composing the Publick Revenue; for permitting the Importation of certain Goods, Wares and Merchandize, the Produce or Manufacture of the European Dominions of the French King, into this Kingdom; and for applying certain unclaimed Monies, remaining in the Exchequer for the Payment of Annuities on Lives, to the Reduction of the National Debt. Price 9s.

In this Act is contained, digested in distinct Alphabetical Order, the Nett Duties of CUSTOMS and EXCISE to be paid, and the Drawbacks to be allowed, on every Article of Merchandize; by Means of which any Person may instantly inform himself of the Duty and Drawback on any particular Article.
