" You damd Infignificant Proud Impearias Rafcal your are Detefted by every one that Works for you, you are the Common Subject of every house · of Refort of the Trade But I hope Soone to put an " end to your pride By Eluminateing the Neigh-" bourhood you live in you now What i mean and if possible would Shove your damd Litle Self in to the midft of the Flames I Shall meat you Some " of these Dark nites and then Ile Dew you out and " out Wile other Mafters are praifed to be good "mafters your are Defpifed by all For your mean "Low Wages which you Give So Rob you poor juneymen and even Starve Familes to Give it away to your Costomers." "

[Here follow Imprecations too borrid to be mentioned.] " Pofible you may think that Some of your men " Sent this But to Let you no I had all ways a Spirit above Working for Sitch a Rafcall as you." "

(Superscribed) " Mr. Miller

Shoemaker

" A Good Jurni-man Shoemaker." " Snow Hill."
