The following Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Sydney, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been by him presented to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

May it please your Majesty,

WE receive with the most dutiful Respect the Honour done us by your Majesty's most Gracious Letter.

It gives us great Satisfaction, that our humble Endeavours in the Support of Religion and Virtue, the equitable Proceedings of our Assemblies, and our uniform Zeal for the Dignity of your Sacred Person and Government, have recommended us to those Marks of Approbation, with which your Majesty hath been hitherto pleased to honour us.

By the same laudable Conduct we trust we shall obtain the same Royal Approbation, and ensure to the Church of Scotland your Majesty's Protection in the Support and Maintenance of all her just Rights and Privileges as established by Law.

Permit us to assure your Majesty, that, avoiding all unnecessary Discussions, and all private and personal Animosities, we shall strictly keep in View the great Purposes of our present Meeting; and that, depending upon the Blessing of God, we shall always consider it as our Honour to exert our constant Endeavours to check and discountenance every Species of Vice, Licentiousness and Discord, and to promote and encourage every Christian Virtue among the People committed to our Care.

The Loyalty and Fidelity of the Right Honourable the Earl of Leven, his Uprightness in the Discharge of his high and important Trust, as well as his Regard to Religion, and the Interests of his Country, and of this Church, are so well known to us, as to render your Majesty's Choice of him, to represent your Sacred Person in this Assembly, a fresh Mark of your Royal Favour; and we trust we shall shew to him all that Respect which is due to the Representative of our Sovereign, and secure to ourselves a happy Conclusion of this Assembly by preserving in our Councils that brotherly Love, and, as far as possible, that Unanimity which your Majesty recommends.

Your Majesty's Donation of One Thousand Pounds we accept with all Gratitude, as a Proof of the Continuance of your Majesty's paternal Concern for the Spiritual as well as Temporal Interests of your People, even in the most remote and uncultivated Parts of your Kingdoms, and it shall be our Study to apply it in such a Manner as may most effectually promote

the pious and benevolent Purposes of the Royal Donor.

That God may abundantly bless your Majesty; that He may continue to guard from every Danger a Life so dear to your Majesty's Subjects, and so precious to the Religion and Liberties of this Country; that He may direct your Councils, prosper your Administration, and establish your Throne in Righteousness; that He may pour down His best Blessing upon your Royal Consort the Queen, the Prince of Wales, and all the Royal Family; endow them plentifully with the Gifts of His Spirit, and fit them for the Duties of their exalted Station; that He may maintain the Succession to the Crown of these Kingdoms in your Illustrious Family to the latest Ages; and that, after a long and happy Reign over a great and free People, you may, through the Merits of our Lord Jesus Christ, be crowned with Eternal Glory in Heaven, is the most fervent Prayer of,
