By the KING, A PROCLAMATION,

For the Encouragement of Piety and Virtue, and for the preventing and punishing of Vice, Profanencys and Immorality.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS We cannot but observe, with inexpressible Concern, the rapid Progress of Impiety and Licentiousness, and that Deluge of Profanenels, Immorality, and every Kind of Vice, which, to the Scandal of Our Holy Religion, and to the evil Example of Our loving Subjects, hath broken in upon this Nation; We therefore esteeming it Our andipenfible Duty to exert the Authority committed to Us for the Suppression of these spreading Evils, fearing lest they should provoke God's Wrath and Indignation against Us, and humbly acknowledging that We cannot expect the Bleffing and Goodness of Almighty God, (by whom Kings reign, and on which We entirely rely) to make Our Reign happy and prosperous to Ourself and Our People, without a religious Observance of God's Holy Laws, to the Intent that Religion, Piety and Good Manners may (according to Our most hearty Desire) shourish and increase under Our Administration and Government, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby declare Our Royal Purpose and Resolution to discountenance and punish all Manner of Vice, Profaneness and Immorality, in all Persons, of whatsoever Degree or Quality, within this Our Realm, and particularly in such as are employed near Our Royal Person; and that, for the Encouragement of Religion and Morality, We will, upon all Occasions, distinguish Persons of Piety and Virtue by Warks of Our Royal Favour. And We do expect and require that all Persons of Honour, or in Flace of Authority, will give good Example by their own Piety and Virtue, and, to their utmost, contribute to the discountenancing Persons of dissolute and debauched Lives, that they being reduced by that Means to Shame and Contempt for their loose and evil Actions and Behaviour, may be thereby also enforced the sooner to reform their ill Habits and Practices, and that the visible Displeasure of good. Men towards them, may (as far as it is possible) fupply what the Laws (probably) cannot altogether prevent. And We do hereby strictly enjoin and prohibit all Our loving Subjects, of what Degree or Quality soever, from playing on the Lord's Day at Dice, Cards, or any other Game whatsoever, either in Publick or Private Houses, or other Place or Places whatsoever; and We do hereby require and command them, and every of them, decently and reverently to attend the Worship of God on the Lord's Day, on Pain of Our highest Displeasure, and

of being proceeded against, with the utmost Rigonr that may be, by Law. And for the more effectual reforming all such Persons who, by Reason of their dissolute Lives and Conversation, are a Scandal to Our Kingdom, Our further Pleasure is, and We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our Judges, Mayors, Sherists, Justices of the Peace, and all other Our Officers and Ministers, both Ecclesiaftical and Civil, and all other Our Subjects, to be very vigilant and strict in the Discovery, and the effectual Prosecution and Punishment of all Persons who shall be guilty of excessive Drinking, Blasphemy, profane Swearing and Cursing, Lewdness, Profanation of the Lord's Day, or other dissolute, immoral, or disorderly Practices; and that they take Care also effectually to suppress all publick Gaming Houses, and other loose and disorderly Houses; and also all unlicensed publick Shews, Interludes, and Places of Entertainment, using the utmost Caution in licensing the same; also to suppress all loose and licentious Prints, Books and Publications, dispersing Posson to the Minds of the Young and Unwary, and to punish the Publishers and Venders thereof; and to put in Execution the Statute made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of the late King Charles the Second, intitled, "An Act for the better Observation of the "Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday;" and also an Act of Parliament made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of the late King William the Third, intitled. "An Act for the more effectual suppressing of Blas-"phemy and Profaneness;" and also an Act passed in the Twenty-first Year of Our Reign, inticled, "An Act for preventing certain Abuses and Profana-"tions on the Lord's Day, called Sunday," and all other Laws now in Force for the punishing and suppressing any of the Vices aforesaid; and also to suppress and prevent all Gaming whatsoever in Publick or Private Houses on the Lord's Day; and likewife that they take effectual Care to prevent all Persons keeping Taverns, Chocolate-Houses, Coffee-Houses, or other Publick-Houses wnatsoever, from selling Wine, Chocolate, Cossee, Ale, Beer, or other Liquors, or receiving or permitting Guests to be or remain in such their Houses, in the Time of Divine Service on the Lord's Day, as they will answer it to Almighty God, and upon Pain of Our highest Difpleasure. And for the more effectual proceeding herein, We do hereby direct and command all Cur And for the more effectual proceeding Judges of Assize, and Justices of the Peace, to give strict Charge, at their respective Assizes and Sessions, for the due Profecution and Panishment of all Persons that shall prefume to offend in any of the Kinds aforefaid, and also of all Persons that, contrary to their Duty, shall be remiss or negligent in putting the said Laws in Execution; and that they do, at their re-spective Assizes and Quarter Sessions of the Peace, cause this Our Royal Proclamation to be publickly read in open Court immediately before the Charge is given. And We do hereby further charge and command every Minister, in his respective Parish Church or Chapel, to read, or cause to be read, this Our Proclamation, at least Four Times in every Year, immediately after Divine Service; and to incite and stir up their respective Auditors to the Practice of Piety and Virtue, and the avoiding of all Immorality and Profaneness. And to the End that all Vice and Debauchery may be prevented, and Religion and Virtue practised by all Officers, Private Soldiers, Mariners and others, who are employed in Our Service by Sea and Land, We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our Commanders and Officers whatsoever, that they do take Care to avoid all Profaneness, Debauchery and other Immoralities, and that, by their own good and virtuous Lives and Conversation, they do set good Examples to all such as are under their Care and Authority, and likewise take Care of and inspect the Behaviour of all such as are under them, and punish all those who shall be guilty of any of the Offences aforesaid, as they will be answerable for the ill Consequences of their Neglect herein.

Constantinople, April 25.

In the Interval between the 10th and 14th ult. Nine Accidents of the Plague have happened here, befides fome others in the following Days of last Month. But for the last Twenty Days all Symptoms of that Contagion have happily disappeared. Malignant Fevers however prevail to a great Degree, in this Residence, owing to the Continuation of cold and damp Weather.

Stockbolm, May 3.

Last Saturday being the Anniversary of the Installation of the Order of the Seraphim, his Swedish Majesty, accompanied by the Knights of that and the other Orders, went in Procession to the Royal Chapel, where Count Charles Emil Lowenhaupt and Baron Duval were knighted and invested with the Star of the Seraphim. This Ceremony being over, the King held an extraordinary Chapter, in which he conferred the Little Crois of the Order of the Polar Star upon Mons. Franc, formerly Chief Secretary in the Foreign Department, and Mons. Faxel, the Swedish Resident at Hamburgh.

This Morning the Empress, after hearing Divine Service at the Cathedral, will embark with her Suite on Board the Fleet of Gallies, consisting of Fifty Vefels of different Sizes, which have been prepared for her Reception, and the Accommodation of her Imperial Majesty's numerous Attendants, and will proceed upon her Voyage down the Dnieper. The Empress continues in perfect Health and Spirits; and Yesterday the Anniversary of her Imperial Majesty's Birth-Day was celebrated here with every Kind of Festivity of which the Place would admit.
