And to the End that all Vice and Debauchery may be prevented, and Religion and Virtue practifed by all Officers, Private Soldiers, Mariners and others, who are employed in Our Service by Sea and Land, We do hereby firicily charge and command all Our Commanders and Officers whatfoever, that they do take Care to avoid all Profaneness, Debauchery and other Immoralities, and that, by their own good and virtuous Lives and Conversation, they do set good Examples to all fuch as are under their Care and Authority, and likewife take Care of and infpect the Behaviour of all fuch as are under them, and pu-nish all those who shall be guilty of any of the Offences aforefaid, as they will be answerable for the ill Confequences of their Neglect herein.
