PROCLAMATION,

For the Encouragement of Piety and Virtue, and for the preventing and punifying of Vice, Profanencys and Immorality.

GEORGE

GEORGE R. HEREAS We cannot but observe, with inexpressible Concern, the rapid Progress of Impiety and Licentiousness, and that Deluge of Profanenels, Immorality, and every Kind of Vice, which, to the Scandal of Our Holy Religion, and to the evil Example of Our loving Subjects, hath broken in upon this Nation; We therefore effecting it Our indifpenfible Duty to exert the Authority committed to Us for the Suppression of these spreading Evils, fearing left they should provoke God's Wrath and Indignation against Us, and humbly acknowledging that We cannot expect the Bleffing and Goodnels of Almighty God, (by whom Kings reign, and on which We entirely rely) to make Our Reign happy and prosperous to Ourself and Our People, without a religious Obfervance of God's Holy Laws, to the Antone that Religion, Piety and Good Manners may (according to Our most hearty Defire) flourish and increase under Our Administration and Govern-ment, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby declare Our Royal Purpole and Resolu-tion to discountenance and punish all Manner of Vice, Profanenels and Immorality, in all Perfone, of whatsoever Degree or Quality, within this Our Realm, and particularly in such as are employed near Our Royal Perfon; and that, for the Encou-ragement of Religion and Morality, We will, upon all Occafions, diffinguila Perfons of Piety and Virtue by Marks of Our Royal Favour. And We do ex-pect and require that all Perfons of Honour, or in Place of Authority, will give good Example by their own Piety and Virtue, and, to their utmoft, contribute to the difcountenancing Perfors of diffolute and debayched Lives, that they being reduced

by that Means to Shame and Contempt for their loofe and evil Actions and Behaviour, may be thereby also enforced the sooner to reform their ill Habits and Practices, and that the visible Displeasure of good Men towards them, may (as far as it is possible) fupply what the Laws (probably) cannot altogether prevent. And We do hereby firicity enjoin and prohibit all Our loving Subjects, of what Degree or Quality foever, from playing on the Lord's Day at Dice, Cards, or any other Game whatfoever, either in Publick or Private Houfes, or other Place or Places whatfoever; and We do hereby require and command them, and every of them, decently and reverently to attend the Worfhip of God on the Lord's Day, on Pain of Our higheft Displeasure, and of being proceeded against, with the utmost Rigonr that may be, by Law. And for the more effectual reforming all fuch Perfons who, by Reafon of their diffolute Lives and Converfation, are a Scandal to Our Kingdom, Our further Pleafure is, and We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our Judges, Mayors, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, and all other Our Officers and Ministers, both Ecclefiafficial and Civil, and all other Our Subjects, to be very vigilant and thrict in the Difcovery, and the effectual Profecution and Puniforment of all Perfons who shall be guilty of excelsive Drinking; Blafphemy, profane Swearing and Curfing, Lewdnefs, Pro-fanation of the Lord's Day, or other diffolute, im-moral, or diforderly Practices; and that they take Care allo effectually to fupprefs all publick Gaming Houfes, and other loofe and diforderly Houfes; and allo all unlicenfed publick Shows, Interludes, and Places of Entertainment, using the utmost Caution in licensing the fame; also to suppress all loose and licentious Prints, Books and Publications, dispersing Poilon to the Minds of the Young and Unwary, and to punifh the Publifhers and Venders thereofs and to put in Exe-cution the Statute made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of the late King Charles the Second, in-titled, 5: An ACC for the better Obfervation of the " Lord's Days commonly called Sanday ;" and alto

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
