diffolute Lives and Conversation, are a Scandal to | Duty, shall be remits or negligent in putting the faid Our Kingdom, Our further Pleasure is, and We-.do hereby firictly charge and command all Our Judges, Mayors, Sheriffs, Juffices of the Peace, and all other Our Officers and Minifters, both Ecclefiaffical and Civil, and all other Our Subjects, to be very vigilant and firict in the Discovery, and the effectual Profecution and Funishment of all Perfons who shall be guilty of excessive Drinking, Blasphemy, profane Swearing and Curfing, Lewdnefs, Profanation of the Lord's Day, or other diffolute, immoral, or diforderly Practices; and that they take Care also effectually to suppress all publick Gaming Houfes, and other loofe and diforderly Houfes; and alfo all unlicenfed publick Shews, Interludes, and Places of Entertainment, using the utmost Caution in licensing the fame; also to suppress all loofe and licentious Prints, Books and Publications, difperfing Poifon to the Minds of the Young and Unwary, and to punish the Publishers and Venders thereof; and to put in Execution the Statute made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of the late King Charles the Second, institled, " An Act for the better Obfervation of the " Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday ;" and alfo .an A& of Parliament made in the Ninth Year of the "Reign of the late King William the Third, intitled, " An Act for the more effectual fuppreffing of Blaf-" phemy and Profanenefs;" and also an Act passed in the Twenty-first Year of Our Reign, intitled, - An Act for preventing certain Abufes and Profana-" tions on the Lord's Day, called Sunday," and all other Laws now in Force for the punishing and fuppreffing any of the Vices aforefaid ; and alfo to fupprefs and prevent all Gaming whatfoever in Publick or Private Houfes on the Lord's Day; and likewife that they take effectual Care to prevent all Perfonskeeping Taverns, Chocolate-Houfes, Coffee-Houfes, or other Publick-Houles whatfoever, from felling Wine, Chocolate, Coffee, Ale, Beer, or other Liquors, or receiving or permitting Guefts to be or remain in fuch their Houfes, in the Time of Divine Service on the Lord's Day, as they will answer it to Almighty God, and upon Pain of Our higheft Difpleafure. And for the more effectual proceeding herein, We do hereby direct and command all Our Judges of Aflize, and Juffices of the Peace, to give strict Charge, at their respective Affizes and Sessions, for the due Profecution and Punishment of all Persons that shall prefume to offend in any of the Kinds aforefaid, and also of all Persons that, contrary to their

Laws in Execution; and that they do, at their refpective Affizes and Quarter Seffions of the Peace, caufe this Our Royal Proclamation to be publickly read in open Court immediately before the Charge is given. And We do hereby further charge and command every Minister, in his respective Parish Church or Chapel, to read, or caufe to be read, this Our Proclamation, at least Four Times in every Year, immediately after Divine Service; and to incite and flir up their respective Auditors to the Practice of Piety and Virtue, and the avoiding of all Immorality and Profanenefs. And to the End that all Vice and Debauchery may be prevented, and Religion and Virtue practifed by all Officers, Private Soldiers, Mariners and others, who are employed in Our Service by Sea and Land, We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our Commanders and Officers whatfoever, that they do take Care to avoid all Profanenefs, Debauchery and other Immoralities, and that, by their own good and virtuous Lives and Conversation, they do fet good Examples to all fuch as are under their Care and Authority, and likewife take Care of and infpect the Behaviour of all fuch as are under them, and punish all those who shall be guilty of any of the Offences aforefaid, as they will be answerable for the ill Confequences of their Neglect herein.
