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Stranzy, March 28.

THE Vessel which in my last was said to be a Dane, forced into this Road, proves a Hamburgher, she is called the *St. Michael*, laden with Malaga Wines, Fruit, and Oyl, bound home; the Captain reports he came out with 30 sail of English Merchantmen under the Convoy of *Sir John Erny*. On Thursday last the *Elizabeth* of London of 100 Tons was cast away near this place, she was bound homewards from *Alicant*, all the men saved except one.

Plimouth, March 29. This day came into this Port a *Hollands* Man of War, and a Merchantman; being bound for *Cadiz*, but forced back by the large bad weather.

Portsmouth, March 31. On Thursday in the afternoon set sail from *Spithead* the *Defiance*, *Sir John Erny* Commander, as also the *Centurion* for *Tangier*, on whom embarked the *Earl of Inchiquin*. His Majesty's Governour there, having several Merchantmen under their Convoy.

Ditto, April 2. On the 31 past, 18 sail of Dutch Merchantmen, under the Convoy of one Man of War of 44 Guns, passed by the *Isth of Wight*, bound for *Cadiz*. The same day a small Vessel arrived in *Comes Road* from *Dunkirk*, the Master whereof reports that there was an Embargo laid upon all ships; but the Master of another Vessel from *Haure de Grace*, from whence he came the 20 past, says, there was likewise an Embargo, but only upon French ships, and that all Foreigners pass freely. The Master adds, that there were 40 sail of Vessels ready to sail for *Newfoundland*.

Madrid, March 22. The Duke de *Montalto* is hourly expected here from *Flanders*; and the Marquis *d'Offera* late General of the Artillery in those Provinces, is made Governour of *St. Sebastian*, and in his place *Don Francisco Marcos de Velasco*, is made General of the Artillery in *Flanders*. The Dutchess of *Orlans* is brought to bed of a Son, to the infinite joy of that Family. We are told that a Fond of 3 or 4 Millions is providing here for the supplying the Governour of *Flanders* with such sums as may enable him to pay the Arrears of the subsidies due to several of the Confederate Princes; and to enable him to put himself in a good posture. On the 26 past happened an unlucky accident in the Bay of *Favosier*, the *Obanham* Sloop that embarked on that Garrison having received 36 Mds of powder to carry them to *Cadiz* to be sold, and the Commander being gone ashore to receive the Governour's Orders, the Moors took the opportunity to fall upon the English, of whom they killed several, and ran the said Sloop ashore; but it blowing extreme hard, only 12 of the Moors escaped, the rest being killed and drowned, 5 of the Sloop's Company were likewise carried ashore, of which two made their escape, and got to *Danger*.

Vienna, March 24. The Duke of *Lorraine* is at present with the Queen of *Poland* at *Inspirck*, from

whence his Highness intended to part in a day or two to the Army, which is appointed to Rendezvous the 15th of the next month towards *Frankfort*. This day the Count *Diestrichsteyn*, the Emperor's Chamberlain, is gone hence for *Inspruck*, to invest his Highness with the Order of the *Golden Fleece*, which the King of *Spain* presents him with. The Council of War is held very frequently, at which the Emperor for the most part assists in person, to concert the operations of the approaching Campaign, which will however be in great measure left to the Duke of *Lorraine*, to take his measures according to those various accidents and circumstances of things which may happen; but this is said as a thing certain, that it is resolved, that the first work shall be to besiege *Friburg*; but whether the whole Army, or only part of it will be employed therein, is not yet certainly said. What was said of the Emperors having pardoned the *Sieur Schultz*, late Governor of *Friburg*, proves a mistake, for on the contrary we are assured, that his Process has been made at *Inspruck*, and that it hath been sent hither to have the Emperors confirmation.

Ditto, March 27. Two days since arrived here a Courier from the *Rhine*, upon which the Council of War hath been since frequently assembled, and we are assured several important resolutions have been taken; and yesterday an Express was sent away to the Duke of *Lorraine*, to carry him, among other Orders, that for his hastning to the Army. The Rebels in *Hungary* have not of late attempted any thing, and we have good ground to believe, that they will not be able to form any considerable Body this whole summer, especially if the King of *Poland* renew his orders for the calling home all his Subjects that are at present among them; as it is expected he will.

Hamburg, April 5. The *Munster* Troops which passed the last year into the service of the King of *Denmark*, under the command of Major-General *Granvilliers*, are coming back, being reduced from 4000 to 7 or 800. On Wednesday next they will pass the *Elbe* at *Blakenes*, and so march home. At the same time there is a report, that their room in the Danish service will be supplied by 6000 men, who, it is said, are on their march, but without any certainty. We are told that a Magazine is preparing at *Dowitz*, for the use of the *Lunenburg* Troops, who are marching 1000 strong towards *Pomerania*, to assist the Elector of *Brandenburg* against the *Suedes*. Count *Goringmarke*, as we are informed, lost a great many men in his last Expedition, by desertion, most of those, who after the action at *Rügen*, had taken service with the *Suedes*, having taken the opportunity of this march to run away. Certain Vessels arrived at *Lubeck* from *Sueden*, bring news, that the *Suedes* Fleet was in great forwardness; and that ten Men of War were already put to Sea, bound for *Riga*, to transport, as is believed, men from thence

Frankfort.

Francfort, March 30. At present all the discourse is of the preparations that are everywhere making for the Campaign. We are assured, that the Duke of *Lorraine*, who made yesterday with his Queen his publick Entry into *Insprucke*, will be very suddenly in these parts, and that the Imperial Army is appointed to Rendezvous about the middle of the next month in our Neighborhood. The Imperial Officers give out, that they shall have an Army in the Field this Summer capable to undertake actions of moment: they say farther, that the whole Army will not be employed in the Siege of *Friburg*, which it seems is positively resolv'd on, but only a part thereof under the command of Count *Capra*, or some other general Officer, while the Duke of *Lorraine* with the main Army marches towards the *Saar*.

Strasbourg, April 1. The French are making a great Magazine at *Schlestadt*, and bring great store of Provisions thither from *Burgundy*. From *Brissac* they write, that the *Sieur Monclar* has received orders to draw all the French Troops that are in these parts together, and with them to pass the *Rhine*, and to post himself near *Friburg*, to observe the motions of the Imperialists, who, it's said, will besiege that place at the opening of the Campaign. On the other side the Imperial Troops which were quartered in *Suabia* are likewise marching, in order to their drawing together into a Body.

Cologne, April 1. The Duke of *Neuburg* has put off his intended journey to *Vienna* till the 16 instant. On Wednesday last several Deputies were sent from *Fuliers* to *Maastricht*, to agree with the Intendant there the matter of Contributions. Tomorrow the Baron de *Landzee* the Imperial Minister goes hence on his way to *Munster*, to endeavor to compose the difference arisen in *Oostfrizeland* between the Princess Regent and the States of that Country.

Mentz, April 3. The Imperial Troops are marching from several parts towards *Worms*, where is appointed the general Rendezvous of the Army the 13 instant; General *Cobs* who is to command the Imperial Infantry is already arrived there, and the Duke of *Lorraine* is expected there in few days.

Amsterdam, April 6. The Letters we receive from *France*, give an account of a Rencontre which had happened in the Channel between six French Men of War commanded by the Chevalier *Chasteau Renaud*, and the Dutch Squadron going for the *Mediterranean* under Admiral *Evertzen*; but we believe it was not that Squadron, but a Fleet of Merchantmen designed for *Spain* and *Portugal*, under the Convoy of three Men of War, the French were engaged with; for that the said Squadron, commanded by the *Sieur Evertzen*, sailed from the *Isle of Wight* on the 9th of the last month. We have likewise reason to disbelieve what the said Letters say of the great damage sustained by some of the Dutch ships in that Rencontre; for if it had been so, we should have heard from *England* that they had put into some of the Ports of that Kingdom to repair them. From *Germany* we have an account, that the Imperial Forces are making haste into the Field; that the Duke of *Lorraine* was every day expected at *Wormes*, and that the general Rendezvous of the Army is appointed about the middle of the next month.

Hague, April 8. In our last we told you that the Deputies which were sent by the States of *Holland*, to attend the Prince of *Orange* in the Camp, were returned; they brought back an answer from

his Highness upon the Points they were ordered to propose to him, very much to the satisfaction of the States, who will separate tomorrow or next day, and adjourn their Assembly for some days. The Deputies of the Admiralties are here, in order to the adjusting the Equipage of certain Men of War designed to cruise in the North Sea this Summer, for the securing our Commerce. As yet we hear nothing of certainty concerning the Equipage of the Squadron for the *Baltick*, though the Danish Minister presses it extremely. A Danish Officer having the leave of this State to raise 7 or 800 Seamen for the service of the King his Master, was some days since disturbed at *Amsterdam* in the execution of his orders, by a Rabble of Women, who complained that their Husbands and Relations already in the service of the King of *Denmark*, were not punctually paid. Of which the Danish Minister has complained to the States, and desired that care may be taken to prevent the like for the future. The 6th instant her Highness the Princess of *Orange*, returned hither from *Antwerp*. Two Fluytes and a Man of War which were sent with Provisions to *Tobago*, and arrived there after the French had been there, and razed the Forts, and destroyed all, are returned, arriving two days since in the *Texel*.

Brussels, April 8. The advices we receive from several parts of *Italy*, that the French have abandoned *Sicily*; that the Marechal de la *Feuillade* having embarked on the French Men of War and Gallies, not only his Soldiers and such other French as were there, but likewise several persons Natives of *Sicily* with their Families, was sailed with them for *France*, and that the City of *Messina* had put it self into the hands of the Spaniards, occasions much rejoicing here; and the more, for that the Crown of *Spain* will now be able, to apply it self with more vigor for the carrying on the War on this side. We are now again quiet in these Countreys, and shall in all appearance continue so till about the middle or latter end of the next month, when the French tell us their King will begin his second Campaign. The Prince of *Orange* continues at his quarters at *Boome*, using all endeavors possible to put his Army into a condition to be able to make head against the Enemy. His Highness, as we are informed, has not at present above 20000 men with him, not thinking it fit to draw his Troops from *Mons* and other places where they are in Garrison. The Letters we receive from the *Rhine* say, that the French make great preparations on that side, and that it is said the King will come in person into those parts.

Paris, April 9. The King and the whole Court is at present at *St. Germain*. In *Flanders* there passes at present not any thing worth writing. From *Germany* we are informed, that the Imperialists are preparing for the Siege of *Friburg*; but we believe they will find the place in so much a better condition than when they left it, that they will not find the taking it now so easie a work as perhaps they imagine. The news we have from *Italy* is, that the Marechal de la *Feuillade* had quitted *Messina* as well as the Castles and Places which the French possessed in *Sicily*. We are in expectation of receiving the particulars of this matter, which as yet we want.
