A PROCLAMATION,

For Encouraging Seamen and Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen and Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation: And We do hereby promise and declare, That all such Able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first Day of October next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, or at Rendezvous on Shore, for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Three Pounds each Man; and all such Ordinary Seamen, fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Two Pounds each Man; and all such Able-Bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man, as Our Royal Bounty; such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Cheque, residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships into which they shall be entered shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen and Landmen: And We do declare, that the Qualifications of the Seamen and Landmen so entering themselves as aforesaid, shall be certified by the Captain, Master, and Boatwain of the Ship or Vessel where they shall enter. And for Prevention of any Abuses, by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty-Money, We do hereby declare and command, That such Seamen and Landmen

belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits.

A PROCLAMATION,

For Recalling and Prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States, and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We are informed, That great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever and wheresoever, (being Our natural-born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, That forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such Foreign Services, and return Home to their Native Countries. And farther, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever, (being our natural-born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and

and command them, and every of them, from henceforth to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without Our Special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience, and exact Conformity. And We do hereby publish and declare, that the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do hereby declare, that if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Seafaring Men, (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, they shall not be reclaimed by Us as Subjects of Great Britain. And we do hereby further promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secrete themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for our said Service by any of our Sea Officers employed for raising Men; the said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the principal Officers and Commissioners of our Navy: And at the Out-ports by the Naval Officers (where there are any); and (where there are no Naval Officers) by the Collectors of Our Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names and Number of Seamen procured in consequence of his Discovery; the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

A PROCLAMATION,

Respecting the GOLD COIN.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it has been represented unto Us, that great Quantities of the Gold Coin of this Realm, deficient in Weight, are now in Circulation, contrary to the Tenour of Our Royal Proclamation of the Twelfth Day of April, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-six, and there being Reason to believe that due Attention is not paid to the weighing of the said Gold Coin, and to the Directions given in the Acts of Parliament now in Force with Respect to the cutting, breaking or defacing of such Pieces thereof as are found to be of less Weight than those declared and allowed by Our said Proclamation to be current and pass in Payment; We do think proper, by this Our Royal Proclamation, to declare and command, in like

Manner as We did declare and command in Our before-mentioned Proclamation of the Twelfth Day of April, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-six, That all Guineas, Half Guineas and Quarter Guineas, more deficient in Weight than the Rates specified in the Table following,

whatsoever: And We do hereby strictly require and command all Our loving Subjects, and particularly all the Officers, Collectors and Receivers of Our Revenues, strictly to conform to the Orders hereby given, and to the Directions and Regulations enacted and established in the several Acts of Parliament now in Force with Respect to the cutting, breaking and defacing such Pieces of the said Gold Coin as shall be found deficient in Weight. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-first Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, in the Twenty-seventh Year of Our Reign.

*Act of the 14th Year of His present Majesty's Reign;
Chap. 70. Sect. 7.*

AND be it further enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, That the Tellers in the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer in Great Britain, and all Receivers, Collectors and other Officers of all His Majesty's Revenues wheresoever, and all other Persons whatsoever, are hereby authorised and required to cut, break or deface, or cause to be cut, broken or defaced, every Piece of Gold Coin of this Realm that shall be tendered to them or any of them in Payment, after such Time and Times as any such Piece of Gold Coin shall, by virtue of any Proclamation of His Majesty in Council, be declared not to be allowed to pass in any Payment whatsoever, any Law or Statute to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding; and the Person tendering the same shall bear the Loss: But if any such Piece so cut, broken or defaced, shall be of due Weight, and appear to be lawful Money, the Person that cut, broke or defaced the same, shall and is hereby required to take and receive the same at the Rate it was coined for: And if any Questions or Disputes shall arise, whether the Piece so cut be lawful Coin, within the Intent and Meaning of His Majesty's Proclamations, it shall be heard and finally determined by the Mayor, Bailiff or Bailiffs, or other Chief Officer of any City or Town Corporate where such Tender shall be made; and if such Tenders shall be made out of any City or Town Corporate, then by some Justice of the Peace of the County inhabiting or being near the Place where such Tender shall be made; and the said Mayor or other Chief Officer, and Justice of the Peace, shall have full Power and Authority to administer an Oath, as he shall see convenient, to any Person, for determining any Questions relating to the Weight and lawful Currency of the said Piece of Coin.

AND be it further enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, that from and after the 31st Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-four, all Weights to be made Use of for Weighing the said Gold and Silver Coin, shall be regulated and ascertained by the Duplicates or Copies of the said Standard Weights of a Guinea; and of a Shilling, and of the Parts and Multiples thereof respectively, lodged in the Custody of the Officer beforementioned, (viz. the Officer appointed by His Majesty for this Purpose, in pursuance of a preceding Clause of the said Act) and after having been tried and compared be not allowed to be current or pass in any Payment therewith, and found to be just and true, shall, in Testimony thereof, be marked by the said Officer with a Stamp or Mark, or Stamps or Marks, to be approved of by the Master of His Majesty's Mint; which Stamps or Marks the said Officer is hereby directed to provide: And in order that the Impression or Impressions made thereby may be known to all His Majesty's Subjects, the said Officer is hereby also directed to publish a Description of the same, by Advertisement in the London Gazette, Three Times at least before the said Thirty-first Day of December, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-four; and the said Officer is hereby required, upon Application made to him, at all reasonable Hours to stamp or mark, in Manner aforesaid, all Weights to be used for weighing the said Gold and Silver Coin, which shall be brought to him for that Purpose, and which he shall find to be just and true, according to the said Duplicates or Copies of the Standard Weights of a Guinea and of a Shilling, and of the Parts and Multiples thereof respectively, hereby directed to be lodged in his Custody, without Fee or Reward, and without wilful Delay: And from and after the said Thirty-first Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-four, no other Weights but such as shall be just and true, according to the Weights with and by which they are hereby directed to be compared and ascertained, and shall be marked in Manner before-mentioned, shall be reputed or accepted in Law to be true or of any Effect for determining the Weight of the Gold or Silver Coin of this Realm.
