ry that was there: whereupon feveral Families, who had been moft inclined to the French, chofe rather to quit thcir Countrey with the French, than to remain there expofed to that Punifhment which perliaps they knew they had def.rved from the spaniards; in all about 100 Families are faid to be gone off, and among them fome of the chiefeft in Meffna. The Marefchal de la Feuiluade being gone on Board the French Men of War at Meflina, lailed from thence with the Gallies, and other Veffels,to Augufta,which place tre likewife fighted, and embarked the Cannon that was there. The Bark, which brings this News, left the Frencb Flect, which confifted in 100 Sail, as well Men of War, Gallies, and other Veffels, 5 dayes fince about 20 Leagues from this place. And this morning here is a report in Town, that they are arfived at Thoullon, excepe- 6 or 7 Men of War which are left on the Coalfs of Sicily,for the fecurity of the Convoy that parted Iaff from Thoulon, which was not yet arrived at Meffina, when the French came from thence,
Paxis, April 1 3. The Letters we receive from Alface, of the 7 th inflant, give us an account, that cight Companies of the Regiment of Turenne, with a Contoy of 30 Mafters, being on their march to Friburg, were, about a I pague from Brijac, met by soo Imperial Hore, who prefently Clarged them; but our Horle behaved themfelves fo well, that they gave fime to the Foot to fhelter themfelves in a Neigh. boaring Wood, there havisg been about 20 men kifed, and as many wounded on our fide; and of the $I_{m p z r i a l i f f s}$ L Lieutenant Colonel,four other Oficers, and fevtral Troopers. After which, the Imperialijts retired, and the Frencb continued their march towards Friburg the 3 dinfant, and the day after two Battalions of Daupbiné and Normandie. The Letters add, that the Portifications which are making at FriSurg, will be finithed before the end of this month. that the Imperialifts had drawn their heavy Cannon out of Philipsburg and Ulme, which was to be employ ed in the Siege of Friburg; that they were making a Bridge over the Rhine below Stresburg, where, auld at willingen, they provided great Magazines; and that the Imperial Troops which had their Winterquarters in suabia, were drawing together. On our fide it is faid, that the Marefchal de crequi will have this Campagne an Army of 40000 men under his Command in Germany. Some will fay, that the King means te go that way in perfon ; but the more probable is, that he will return to Flanders. Certain it is, that his Majefly purpofes to part fiom St. Germains about the middle of the next month, and that all the Troops in thofe Parts have Orders to be ready by the firft of the fame, The Letters we receive from © cmbray and /alenciennes affure us, that Mons is fo clefely blocked up, that no Body can get in, or come out, and that the Inhabitants are in want of feveral Neceffaries. From Catalonia they write, that Don fuan had given Orders for the drawing together between 12 and 15000 men of the Militia of the Countrey, to which he would join about 10000 others, and fo form an Army of 22 or 2 sooo men, and there he pretended to have very early in the Field. We have an account of a defign which the spaniards had formed to furprize Perpignan, by means of a correfpondeuce they held with certain perfons in the Town, but that it was difcovered. The Marefchal de la Feuilade hath, by the Kings Command, abandoned MLeffun, and what other places the Freuch poffer-
fed in sicily, embarked all his Troops, which corts filted in sooo Foot; 800 Horie, and 200 Dragoons; (having killed their Horfes, or made them otherwife unferviceable ) as allo about 40 Noble Fanilies, and fuch others, as were unwilling to remain there; and this day News is come of their arrival, with the French Fleet of Men of War and Gallies, in Provence.

Datto, April 16. We have the confirmation of the arrival of the Marefchal de la Fenillade at Tbouion 3 two Gallies of his Fleet were feparated from it in bad weather, and efcaped very narrowly being loft. Twotereat Barks, ta which were four Troops of Horledifmonnced, have been caken by two Privateers belonging to Z ealand, who were Cruifing in thofe Seas 3 as alfo a Merchant: flip beJonging to Marfettes, very michly Iaden. We areaffured shat above 4000 Perfons, who were Natives and Inhabitants of Meffine, are come away from thence, not knowing what ufage they mught recive from the $S_{p i n i a r d s}$. The Sieur de रaifne, who commands our rleet, is appointed to tranfport alt the Troops that were is Sictly, to Catalontot, where they are neceffary, confiseringthe preparations the Spaniards are making, to breng a confacerable Army into the firld on that fide. The Abbé d'Eftroderiz who is ar prelent the Kings Ambaffador ac Vewice, having defined lesve to recura home, the King has appointed the Sieur de Varengevile to facceed him in that Employment. Very fevere Prohitbithons have been made here anainft the wearing of embrnideries of Gold or Silver; and the Officers, whofe bufincfs it is to fee them execuced, bave power to fearcb any Houfe, where chey fufpee any Embroidery is working; and the ocher day one of the faid Officers ftopped a Perfon of Quahty, as he was going into his Coach, and in the Kengs name demanded of him his Coat, which was Embroidered with Gold; the Gepelemay defired the Officer to go home with him in his Coach, and bting ceme thither ${ }_{2}$ gave him his Coar.
