Hague, October 12.

On the 9th Instant in the Morning, his Serene Highness the Duke of Brunswick made his Dispositions for bombarding the Town of Amsterdam; but a Deputation, in the Interval, waited on his Serene Highness, intreating him to name the Conditions to which he wished the City to subscribe; which being signified to them, the following Capitulation was signed the next Day at Noon, and the same Evening his Serene Highness took Possession of the principal Gate of the City.

1. A Detachment of the King's Troops, consisting of One Hundred and Fifty Men, Ten Chasseurs, and Four orderly Hussars, shall occupy the Leyden Gate; and Two Pieces of Artillery shall be placed within Cannon Shot of that Gate.

2. Two Battalions with Chasseurs shall be posted at Overtoom.

3. In order to avoid giving Occasion for any Disturbances, none of the King's Troops shall enter the City without the previous Concurrence of the Magistrate.

4. The Burgomasters and City Council shall take the most effectual Measures for securing the Sluices at the Harlem and Muyden Gates.

5. Legal Information shall be given daily to his Serene Highness of the Progress made in carrying

into Execution the Resolutions of the State, to which the Town of Amsterdam has already acceded.

6. Monf. de Haaren, the Prussian Commissary, shall be informed of every Thing relative to the Disarming, in order to report an exact Account of it.

The same Bricks and Wood were then placed upon the Seat of Mr. Moore's Patent Chaise, which was pushed forward with equal Velocity till the Shafts fell to the Ground, but all the Bricks and Wood remained undisturbed upon the Seat; they likewise continued so when the Carriage was stopped by running the Wheels against the Logs of Wood; which proves that his Chaise is safer to ride in than any Phaeton or Four-wheeled Carriage.
