WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 26th of last Month, to direct, that the several Bounties therein mentioned should continue to be paid to every Able and Ordinary Seaman, and Able-Bodied Landman, who should, on or before the 31st Day of December next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and also that the Rewards therein mentioned should be paid to any Person who should, on or before the said 31st Day of December next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who might secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers employed in raising Men:—His Majesty, judging it no longer necessary to continue the Armament at Sea, is pleased, by and with the

Advice of His Privy Council, to order and declare; that the said Bounties and Rewards shall from henceforth cease, determine, and be no longer paid or payable, any Thing in the said Order contained to the contrary notwithstanding. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice; and govern themselves accordingly.
