

## PONDICHERY PRIZE MONEY.

**HIS** Majesty having been graciously pleased to grant to Vice Admiral Sir Edward Vernon, Knt. and Major General Sir Hector Monro, Knt. of the Bath, in Trust for themselves and the Forces employed under their respective Commands, at the last Siege and Capture of Pondicherry in the East-Indies, the Proceeds of the Booty and Plunder found therein; and the Honourable the East-India Company having made a Donation of Twenty Thousand Pounds to the aforesaid Commanders, and Forces employed on the above-mentioned Siege, as a Reward for their Bravery, and in Consideration of the Severity of the Service; Notice is hereby given, That the said Sir Edward Vernon and Sir Hector Monro, pursuant to the Authority vested in them, have ordered a Distribution of the Army's Shares of the Proceeds of said Booty and Plunder, and East India Company's Donation, to be made in London to such of the Officers and Men of the Company's Troops, and the Troops of his Highness the Nabob of Arcot, who served at the said Siege, and as are residing now in Great Britain and Ireland; and have also ordered that Directions be transmitted to Fort St. George, Madras, for the Payment of the Shares of such Officers and Men as are in the East Indies; in Consequence whereof the Payments will be made in London at Mr. A. Brodie's, No. 41, Ely-place, Holborn, and commence on Wednesday the 2d Day of January next, and to continue the Three following Days; the Shares not then demanded will be recalled the First Wednesday in every Month until further Notice. Proper Certificates of the Parties who claim Pondicherry Prize Money, having served at the Siege thereof, will be required from the Non-commissioned and Privates.
