Portsmouth, April 16.

He 1 3th inflant arrived here the Richard Adventure, Richard Scrutten Mafter, from Roan, who brings news, that he got from thence, as it were by flealth, for that there was an Embargo upon all Veffels whatfoever, and that he left there four or five Englifh Veffels under the faid Embargo. The 14th arrived at Spithead the Harwich, Sir Robert Robinfon Commander, from the Weffward. Yefterday arrived here three or four Frigats from the Downs, to take in Soldiers here to be transforted to Flanders. Volentier Seamen come in in great numbers, fo that the Royal Fames and Ebarles are almost mann'd without prefing any men.

Fienna, April 10. We expect here in few days the Ambaffador of the Czar of Moleovy, who is on his way. It is faid that he comes to demand the Archdutchefs Anne, the Emperors Sifter, in Marriage for the Czar, as also to propole an Alliance against the Turks; but it's thought he will not have any fuccels in either. Their Imperial Majefties intendafter, the Holy-days to go to Newstat, to be fo much nearer the Allembly of the States of Hungary, who are to me t about the 20th of this month. His Imperial Majefty has received Letters from the Duke of Lorrain, by which he gives him an account that he was halling to the Army, which he hoped to have in the Field by the latter end of the month. The Emperor has appointed Count Leflie to command his Troops in Husgary, where the Rebels have not of late attempted any thing of moment; and we have no great reason to apprehend they will be able to do much, confidering the Turks do again and again declare they will not give them any countenance or protection.

Copenhagen, April 12. We have heard nothing more of the loss which the Suedes are faid to have fulfained before *Christianstadt*, which makes fome people yet doubt the truth of it; and the more, for that all the account we have of that matter, was brought by fome Bores only. We have advice from feveral places, that the King of Sueden will be very fuddainly in the Field and that he will have an Army of 24 or 25009 Men; to answer which we are on this fide endeavouring to bring a very good Army into the Field, and to make it up the Bilhop of Munster is to assist our King with 6000 Men, the Landgrave of Hessen with 2000, and the next week the Sieur Guldenlieu parts hence for Norway, from whence he will return again in three weeks with 4000 Men. But our greatelt diligence is used to get out our Fleet betimes, to hinder the Suedes from fending any Succours to Pomeren, and particularly the transporting thither the Suedish Troops from Livonia. According to the last account we had by Sea from Stockholme, the Suedes do not fit out their whole Fleet, but only a Squadron of Men of War, which are to cruife on their Coafts.

Hamburg, April 19. In our laft we told you, we had received advice from Roftocke that the Branden-

burgs had made themfelves Mafters of the Fortrefs of Dangarten; which is fo far from being true, that we are fince informed from certain hands that the

we are fince informed from certain hands that the Brandenburg Troops, upon Ordersthey received from the Elector, have wholly quitted the Siege, and are retired towards Domitz, what the reason hereof may be, we are yet to learn. There are Letters. from Dantzicke of the 12th inflant, which fay, that a Vessel was arrived there in five days from Riga, who reported that he left that City in a Plame, which we hope will prove a miltake. The Elector of Brandenburg and Dukes of Lunenburg feem diffatisfied with the Duke of Mechlenburg, whom they look upon as a Favouret of the suedes, and therefore it is faid that their Troops are gone to attack Domitz, which belongs to that Duke: by the next we shall know the gertainty.

Metz, April 12. The Officers of the Marelchal Metz, April 12. The Officers of the Marelchal Me Crequi's Army arrive here daily from France, and repair to their respective commands. We hear the Duke of Lorrain will be in the Field with the Impe-Lial Army by the beginning of the metrif infonth? wherefore the Mareschal de Grequi is likewise haftening to take the Field with the Troops he is to command. He expects a confiderable detachement? from Flanders, and io foon as that arrives, he will be able to bring a very confiderable Army together.

Straburg, April 15. Yefterday arrived here a Perfon from Schleftadt, who gives us an account, that a great part of the Fortifications of that City was fallen down fome days fince, at which the French were very much troubled, fearing the like would happen to all the reft, and that the Governor had fent an Exprefs to inform the King of it. From Brijac they tell us, That the Sieur Monelar, underflanding from all hands that the Imperialifts would for a certain open the Campagne with the Siege of Friburg, had taken care to reinforce that Garifon, to that degree, that there are at prefent 8 or 9 Battalions in the place ; and befides, he pretends to have an Army of 20000 Men in Brigow to obferve the Enemies motions.

Mentz, April 17. The Imperial Troops are every where on their march to their Rendezvous, which, it's faid, is appointed for the 29th inftant. The Duke of Lorrain has ordered a detachement to be made of 20 Men out of each Company, who are to march towards Brilgow, and joining with those Troops which have had their Winter-quarters in Suabia, befiege Friburg. The Duke of Lorrain has likewife given Orders for the making a Bridge'over the Rhine below Straburg, and for the raifing certain Redoubts to fecure it.

Amfterdam, April 22. The French Ambaffadors'at Nimeguen have made a Declaration of the Terms on which the King their Mafter is willing to admit of a Peace : We have feet the faid Proposals made publick here; and the Parties have only till the roth of May, New Stile, allowed them to receive them in. The Letters we receive from Germany affure us, that the Imperial Troops are marching to their general Rendezvous; Rendezvous: That the Army will be certainly in the Field by the beginning of May, That part of it only will beliege Friburg; while the Duke of Lorrain with the main Body observes the motions of the Enemy. The Prince of Orange is at prefent at Breda, from whence his Highnels is expected in a day or two at the Hague.

Hague_April 22. This evening her Highnels the Prince is of Orange parted hence, for Breda, to meet the Prince there, whom, it's faid, the States have defired to make a flep hither, to confult with him con-cerning the present affairs. The Proposals made by the French Ambaffadors at Nimeguen for a general-Peace, are; it feems, made publick; and though they Are fuch as feem to give little ground for it, yet many people here continue to talk of Peace: while at the fame time all our Advices from England speak of nothingbut of the vigorous preparations that are making there both by Land and Sea. On Tuesday next the States of Holland will be re-affembled. The Heer Van Heed cheren, who hath been fometime on the part of this State at the Court of the Dukes of Zell and Wolfembuttel, being returned hither, was yesterday in the Affembly of the States to give an account of his Negotiation, and is this morning gone to wait upon his Highness. The Sieur Graventhals, who is here with a Character from the King of Poland, hath had Audience of the States. Yelterday a Conference was held here between the Ministers of the several Allies and the Deputies of this State, on the Subject of the Propofals lately made by the French for a general Peace. From Denmark we hear, that the Bilhop of Munster had made an Agreement with that King, to furnish him this Campagne with 6000 Men, that the Landgrave of Heffen would likewife affift him with 2000, and that 4000 were expected from Norway ; fo that the King of Denmark would have a very good Army in Schonen this Summer.

Bruffels, April 22. The account we gave you in our laft, that the French were fending a very great detachement towards Germany, is confirmed, and we are farther affured that it is composed of at least 20 thousand Men. At the same time we understand from Haynault, that the French have brought other Troops into that Country, and that they draw together about Mons, as fome believe to attack it: but what feems more probable at prefent is, that the Enemies intention in these their motions about Mons, is to hinder the Succours which our Governour General, the Duke de Killa Hermofa, is preparing to put into the place, which is of great concernment to the fe-curity of it, the Duke d' Aerfabor the Governour having, as we are informed, acquainted his Excellency that they within want feveral necessaries, without which they cannot fubfift much longer. On Tuesday night haft his Highness the Prince of Orange returned to Baume from Breda; the next day about noon Co-long! Churchill, Envoye from His Majefty of Great Britain, arrived in his Highness quarters, and yesterday he came hither; He had immediately Audience of his Excellency, and this day Don Bernardo de Salinas, appointed for that purpole by his Excellency, had a Conference with him. Yesterday the Prince of Orange went from Boome to Malines, to confer with Count Waldee concerning feveral matters relating to the Army, and to morrow his Highnels goes back to gneds. From Dendermond they write, that the Governour thereof apprehending the Frenc' have long defign upon that place, hath ca ed

the Dykes to be cut, and the Country round to be fet under water.

Oftend, April 23. The 21ft inftant arrived in this Road four Yachts from England, on board of which were 400 Efiglifh Soldiers, who the next day came alhore, and are fent to Bruges. From the French Conquelts we have an account, that the French King will be at Ghent the 26th of the next month, and that then we shall hear of fome great Action.

Paris, April 23. The Court continues at St. Germains, and it's believed will do fo, till the King returns to Flanders, which it's conflantly faid will be about the middle of the next month; the preparations in the mean time for the Kings journey are making. Some have reported that the King would take a turn towards Normandy and Britany, to visit the Maritime Places in those Provinces; but it is without any ground. Two Express have lately arrived from Germany, the one difpatched by the Sieur de Monelar, and the other by the Marefchal de Crequi, to give his Majefty an account that the Imperialifts are drawing together with all the diligence poffible, and that it is not to be doubted but their fiff work will be to befiege Friburg ; upon which, Orders, as we are told, have been fent to the Mareschal d' Humieres, to haften the march of the detachement defigned for Germany. The King is extreamly pleafed with the Conduct of the Mareichal de la Feuillade, in bringing off his Troops from Stelly, without any diforder or commotion among the people; who, if the thing had not been managed with a great deal of prudence and fecrefie, would not perhaps have fuf fered the French to have parted to quietly.
