**W**HEREAS there was this Day read at the Board, the humble Memorial of Sir George Baker, Baronet, Physician to Their Majesties, and President of the College or Commonalty of the Faculty of Physic in London, setting forth, that the said President and College have, with great Care, Pains and Industry, revised, corrected and reformed a Book by them formerly published, intituled, *Pharmacopoeia Collegii Regalis Medicorum Londinensis*, prescribing and directing the Manner of preparing all Sorts of Medicines therein contained, together with the true Weights and Measures by which they ought to be made, which Book is now perfected and ready to be published, and it is conceived will contribute to the public Good of His Majesty's Subjects, by preventing all Deceits, Differences and Uncertainties in making or compounding of Medicines, if, for the future, the Manner and Form prescribed therein should be practised by Apothecaries, and others, in their Compositions of Medicines: The Memorialist therefore most humbly prays, that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to enforce the Observance thereof, in such Manner as to His Majesty shall seem meet:— His Majesty this Day took the said Memorial into His Royal Consideration, and being desirous to provide in all Cases for the common Good of His People, and being persuaded that the establishing the general Use of the said Book may tend to the Prevention of such Deceits in the making and compounding Medicines, wherein the Lives and Health of His Majesty's Subjects are so highly concerned, hath therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby to notify to all Apothecaries and others concerned, to the Intent they may not pretend Ignorance thereof, that the said Book called *Pharmacopoeia Collegii Regalis Medicorum Londinensis*, is perfected and ready to be published; And His Majesty doth therefore strictly require, charge and command, all and singular Apothecaries, and others whose Business it is to compound Medicines, or distil Oils or Waters, or make other Extracts, within any Part of His Majesty's Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Dominion of Wales, or Town of Berwick upon Tweed, that they, and every of them, immediately after the said *Pharmacopoeia Collegii Regalis Medicorum Londinensis* shall be printed and

published, do not compound or make any Medicine or Medicinable Receipt or Prescription, or distil any Oil or Waters, or make other Extracts that are or shall be in the said *Pharmacopoeia Collegii Regalis Medicorum Londinensis* mentioned; or named, in any other Manner or Form than is or shall be directed, prescribed and set down by the said Book, and according to the Weights and Measures that are or shall be therein limited, except it shall be by the special Direction or Prescription of some learned Physician in that Behalf:— And His Majesty doth hereby declare, that the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur His Majesty's just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for such their Contempt and Offences, according to the utmost Severity of the Law.

*WHEREAS divers Persons, to whom Money has been issued for Public Services, have neglected to deliver into this Office the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, in the Manner, and within the Time prescribed by the Act for better examining and Auditing the Public Accounts of this Kingdom, the Commissioners for Auditing the Public Accounts have directed that Copies of the following Sections of the said Act be inserted in the London Gazette, in order that all Persons to whom Public Money has been, or shall be, so issued, may be informed of the Consequences of such Neglect.*

SECTION XVII. And whereas great Losses and Inconveniences have arisen to the Public, by Sub-Accountants not having been put in Charge till a long Time has elapsed after the Monies were issued to them, be it enacted, That the Paymaster-General of His Majesty's Forces, the Treasurer of the Navy, the Treasurer of the Ordnance, and every other Public Officer who shall hereafter pay into the Hands of any Person or Persons whomsoever, Money for Public Services, by Way of Imprest or on Account, shall, within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty five, and within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December in every future Year, transmit an Account of all Sums of Money issued or paid by him or them to any Person or Persons, for the Public Service, within the preceding Year, to the Commissioners to be appointed under the Authority of this Act; who shall, and they are hereby required forthwith to transmit Duplicates of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall immediately, on Receipt of such Accounts, put the several Sums so issued in Charge against the Parties, in like Manner as now practised with respect to Persons who receive Money by Way of Imprest, and on Account, at the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer.

SECTION XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Times abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

SECTION XX. And be it further enacted and declared, That every Sub-Accountant to whom

Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Services, in case the Money so issued shall have been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unless it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months of the usual annual Time of the Determination of each Account respectively; and in case such Monies shall have been issued for Services to be performed in any Part of Europe out of this Kingdom, then the Vouchers shall be delivered within Four Months of the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; if in the West Indies, the Continent of America, or in Africa, within Six Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; and if in the East Indies, within Twelve Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; unless it shall in each and every Case be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury, that the Failure of transmitting the same, within the Periods beforementioned, was unavoidable; in which Case such further Delay may be granted by Warrant under the Hands of the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three of them, as they shall judge reasonable; and in such Cases the Vouchers shall be delivered at the Expiration of the Term of Delay so granted, on Pain, upon Failure in any of the abovementioned Cases, of paying such Fine to His Majesty as the Court of Exchequer, on Application made to them, shall think fit to set and impose; which Fine the said Court is hereby authorized and empowered to set and impose accordingly.

SECTION XXII. Provided always, and be it enacted, that when any Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall transmit to the Commissioners, to be appointed under the Authority of this Act, a sufficient and satisfactory Discharge from the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy, or the Commissioners for Sick and Hurt, for any Monies he or they shall have received in the said Departments severally, the said Commissioners shall transmit a Duplicate of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall forthwith strike out the Name or Names of such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants from the Imprest Roll; and such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall from thenceforth be discharged from any other or further Account for the same.

That the Traffic and Slavery of the Human Species is a direct Violation of the Precepts of true Religion; in Opposition to the Principles of Liberty, Justice, and Humanity; and disgraceful in the Extreme to every Country by which it is encouraged, or even tolerated.

That the African Slave Trade is such a Traffic; and that this Meeting regards with Abhorrence, a Commerce productive of Oppression, Cruelty, and even Murder, upon Millions of our Fellow Creatures.

That this Meeting, though fully sensible of the Importance of Manufactures and Commerce to the real Interests of this Nation, is yet too jealous of that Reputation which all honest Men ought to desire, to wish the Promotion of any Traffic, however lucrative, by Means inconsistent with Humanity or Integrity; and they are convinced moreover, that the Traffic in Question is highly impolitic as well as inhuman.

That it is extremely desirable to call the Attention of Parliament to this unjustifiable Traffic, by Petitions from the People at large.

That it is expedient to present a Petition with this View, from the Town and Neighbourhood of Manchester.

That a circular Letter be addressed, on Behalf of this Meeting, to the Mayor, or other chief Magistrate, of every principal Town throughout Great Britain, requesting their Concurrence in a similar Measure.

That in order to procure the general and final Abolition of the African Slave Trade, it will be highly expedient to extend Information on this important Subject to every Part of Europe.

That this Meeting approves of the Steps which have been taken in Manchester, by the Boroughreeve, Constables, and other Gentlemen, who have hitherto interested themselves in this Business.

That the Society formed in London, for the Purpose of effecting the Abolition of the Slave Trade, having been the First to come forward as a Body in this Kingdom, in Favour of the oppressed Africans, are entitled to the particular Thanks of this Meeting, and of every other Friend to this Cause of Humanity, for a Conduct so disinterested and so laudable.

That the further Sum of One Hundred Guineas, out of the Money subscribed in Manchester, be transmitted to the Committee of that Society, in Aid of their truly benevolent Exertions.

That these Resolutions be immediately published in such a Manner, as shall insure their Circulation throughout the Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland.
