To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most faithful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with the most lively Sentiments of zealous Duty and affectionate Attachment to your Sacred Person and Government.

The heavy Loss which your Majesty's Service has sustained by the Death of the late Lord Lieutenant affects us with unfeigned Sorrow; a Sorrow deeply impressed by the Remembrance of that high Sense of Integrity and Honor, that genuine Glow of Benevolence and Generosity, and that engaging Spirit of Condescension and Affability, which distinguished and adorned that Nobleman's Character, and which, whilst they secured our Affection and Esteem, contributed, in so eminent a Degree, to the Welfare and Prosperity of this Nation:

We gratefully acknowledge your Majesty's Goodness in re-appointing to the Government of this Kingdom the Marquis of Buckingham, in the Experience of whose distinguished Abilities, Integrity and Attention to the Public Good; we place our well grounded Confidence; that your Majesty's Government will be administered with the utmost Advantage to the real Interests of Ireland:

We take the liveliest Share in the Satisfaction your Majesty feels in the present Situation of Foreign Affairs, and particularly in the Restoration of the Constitution and Tranquillity of the United Provinces, favored by the seasonable and vigorous Exertions which were made by your Majesty, and by the brilliant Success of the Prussian Troops under the Conduct of his Serene Highness the Duke of Brunswick. We observe, with the most heartfelt Satisfaction, the Effects of the spirited Measures which your Majesty has adopted on this Occasion, as well in the increased Lustre which has been derived from them to your Majesty's Crown, as in the solid Advantages which they bring to the essential Interests of your Dominions:

My Lords,

I Will forthwith transmit this dutiful and loyal Address to be laid before His Majesty.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens and Burgeses, in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Ireland, in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to lay before your Majesty our unfeigned Expressions of Duty, Loyalty and Attachment to your Royal Person, Family and Government.

We cannot sufficiently deplore the heavy Loss which your Majesty's Service has sustained by the premature and much-lamented Death of our late Chief Governor. The wise and steady Course of his public Administration had established the Tranquillity and exalted the Credit of the Nation, whilst the amiable Tenor of his private Virtues had conciliated the Love and Esteem of every Rank and Description of the People. As long as the nobler Qualities of the Mind, the benevolent Affections of the Heart, Affability in Deportment, and Complacency of Manners, shall continue to warm the Feelings and engage the Attachments of a generous and grateful Nation, the Memory of the Duke of Rutland will be preserved and cherished in the Bosoms of Irishmen.

Amidst these Effusions of our heartfelt Regret, we acknowledge your Majesty's peculiar Attention and Regard to our Situation in the re-appointing to be Chief Governor of this Kingdom a Nobleman who, during his former Residence in Ireland, had exerted the most unremitting Attention to its Affairs and Interests, and merited the amplest Testimony of Gratitude for the Wisdom and Integrity of his Government.

We fully participate in the Satisfaction which results to your Majesty from the present Situation of Foreign Affairs. We shall cultivate with Earnestness those Objects which have been recommended to our Care, by directing our Attention to the further Extension of our Linen Manufacture, the Protection and Regulation of the Protestant Charter Schools, the Security of the Established Church, and to those Principles which Wisdom and Humanity point out for the Promotion of Education and useful Knowledge.

In reviewing the Progress which our Commerce, Manufactures and Credit have made under your Majesty's auspicious Protection and Influence, we are stimulated to cherish, with increased Assiduity, the Blessings of Peace.

We repeat, however, with Cheerfulness, our Declaration to stand and fall with Great Britain. If the Honor of your Majesty's Crown, or the Interests of your Dominions, had obliged your Majesty to resort to the Spirit and Resources of your People, there is no Part of your Empire from which your Majesty would have received a warmer and more zealous Support than from your loyal Subjects of Ireland.

We are sensible of your Excellency's Wisdom in recommending to our particular Care that great Staple of our Commerce, the Linen Manufacture; as well as the Protection and Regulation of the Protestant Charter Schools, the Security of the National Church, and those Principles of Education and useful Knowledge, which have been already suggested for improving the Morals of the People. Our Attention will be immediately directed to those great Objects which your Excellency has selected with such judicious Knowledge of our real Situation and true Interests.

We cannot be sufficiently grateful for the Satisfaction your Excellency has expressed at the Increase of our Credit and Prosperity, and the Extension of our Commerce and Manufactures, whilst we are convinced of your Anxiety to improve the Advantages which may be derived to them from sedulously cultivating the Blessings of Peace.

We must, however, request your Excellency to assure His Majesty, that no Part of His Empire would have displayed more Alacrity and Zeal for His Service, if He had judged it necessary to call forth the Spirit and Resources of His People, in Defence of the Honor of His Crown, or the general and common Interests of the Empire.

Vienna, January 9.

The Marriage of the Archduke Francis with the Princess Elizabeth of Wirtemberg; was solemnized last Sunday Evening in the Chapel of the Imperial Palace. The Elector of Cologne officiated on that Occasion in his Archiepiscopal Capacity. The whole Imperial Family afterwards supped together in public. A masked Ball was given on Monday, to which Four Thousand Persons were invited. The different Theatres of this Capital have been opened for general Admission gratis; and the magnificent Festivals, which have been continued every Day since at Court, will be concluded this Evening by a Ball in the Emperor's Apartments.
