To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament allembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

W E, your Majefty's most faithful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament affembled, beg Leave to approach your Majefty with the most lively Sentiments of zealous Duty and affectionate Attachment to your Sacred Perfor and Government.<sup>9</sup>

The heavy Lofs which your Mäjefty's Service has fuffained by the Death of the late Lord Lieutenant affects us with unfeigned Sorrow; a Sorrow deeply. imprefied by the Remembrance of that high Senfe of Integrity and Honor, that genuine Glow of Benevolence and Generofity, and that engaging Spirit of Condefcention and Affability, which diftinguithed and adorned that Nobleman's Character, and which, whilf they fecured our Affection and Effeem, contributed, in fo eminent a Degree, to the Welfare and Profperity of this Nation.

We gratefully acknowledge your Majefty's Goodnefs in re-appointing to the Government of this Kingdom the Marquis of Buckingham, in the Experience of whole diffinguished Abilities, Integrity and Attention to the Public Good, we place our well grounded Confidence, that your Majefty's Government will be administered with the utmost Advantage to the real Interests of Ireland.

We take the livelieft Share in the Satisfaction your Majefty feels in the prefent Situation of Foreign Affairs, and particularly in the Reftoration of the Conflitution and Tranquillity of the United Provinces, favored by the featonable and vigorous Exertions which were made by your Majefty, and by the brilliant Succefs of the Pruffian Troops under the Conduct of his Serene Highnefs the Duke of Brunfwick. We obferve, with the most heartfelt Satisfaction, the Effects of the fpirited Meafures which your Majefty has adopted on this Occafion, as well in the increafed Luftre which has been derived from them to your Majefty's Crown, as in the folid Advantages which they bring to the effential Interefts of your Dominions.

We shall not fail to direct our Attention to the Support of our Linen Manufacture, the Protection and Regulation of our Protestant Charter Schools, the Security of the Church of Ifeland, and to those Principles which Wildom and Humanity dictate for the Advancement of Education and uleful Knowledge.

We are fenifible of the happy Effects of Peace, and the rifing Industry, Commerce and Credit of the Country. But while under your Majefty's aufpicious and paternal Protection we enjoy thole ineffimable Bleffings, with Pride we boaft, that no Part of your Majefty's Dominions feels a warmer Concern for the Honor of your Crown and the general Interests of the Empire : And had your Majefty judged it neceffary to call forth into Action the Spirit and Refources of your People; you would have found from us that forward
